FREIGHT SHED STEALING.

Several Arrests Create Sensation at Port Arthur.

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—A sensation has been caused by the arrest of Reginald Newman, foreman in the Canadian Northern Railway local street, Charles Carroll, shipper for a lumberland street producer, and a William Williamson, a teamster, in connection with the alleged conspiracy by which it would appear the Canadian Northern Railway for some time has been systematically robbed through abstraction of goods from the local sheds.

CABLE FLASHES AND TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

East End Emigration Fund 6100 People to Canada—Tand Visits the Douma.

London—The east end emigration fund has sent 6100 men to Canada during the year ending September.

Ottawa—The Speaker denies that Bourassa's resignation was irregular.

Ottawa—The government will hand over to Saskatchewan the coal area at Eagle Lake.

Montreal—Advices to the C.P.R. say the Mount Temple's cargo can be saved, and the steamer, perhaps, as well.

London, Ont.—Hon. C. S. Hyman has arrived here and will drive to his residence. He is said to be unwell.

Ottawa—Hon. H. R. Emmerson, it is rumored, will become general manager of the Intercolonial Railway.

Glencoe—Robert Digdon, C. P. R. agent at North Glencoe, aged 55, shot himself with a rifle.

Port Huron—The Grand Trunk shops here will be enlarged. The staff will be increased from 1000 to 1600 men.

Deseronto—Frederick Pratt, an English lad, fell against a circular saw at the Deseronto Box Factory and was killed.

St. Petersburg—U. S. Secretary of War Taft visited the Douma.

North Sydney, N. S.—The Dominion Coal Co.'s steamer Coban ran hard on the rocks at Black Point and will be a total loss. She was valued at \$55,000.

Peterborough—Richard Hall, trustee of the late Mrs. Charlotte Nicholls, presented to the city a deed of a fine building on Simcoe-street, formerly a dry goods store, for a public library. The building is 46 x 70 feet, three stories high and valued at \$20,000. The gift was accepted.

London—Hon. Clifford Sifton addressed the Liberal Colonial Club. He said the all-road route justified itself. Twenty-four knot steamers would be required for the Atlantic end.

Vancouver, B. C.—The King will get sightlings on the oriental immigration question in Seattle and San Francisco.

Winnipeg—John Herron, M.P., was unanimously renominated for the federal house.

SHOWS THE WEAKNESS.

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—(Special.)—The debate upon the address was continued in the senate by Sir Mackenzie Bowell. He referred to the acquisition of the senate from the lower house and said that in no manner could Sir Wilfrid have more clearly expressed his want of confidence in the ability of the men who supported him in the commons than in going elsewhere for cabinet material. Alleged Attempt to Fire and Blow Up an Italian Tenement House—General City News.

HAMILTON, Dec. 3.—(Special.)—The residents of Main-street, about 100 strong, appeared before the board of works this evening to protest against the proposal to give Lake and Bailey a switch on East Main-street. The matter was referred to the city engineer and solicitor.

The Colonial Engineering Co.'s offer to light the streets and supply power by producer gas engines was not considered. The board will have an over-draft of \$15,000.
