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BOMB MADE FOR J. ROCKEFELLER BURSTS, KILLS 4

Many Hurt and Whole Tenement Block is Wrecked by Explosion in New York

MAKER OF BOMB ONE OF THE DEAD

Arthur Caron, an I.W.W. Agitator, Taken From Ruins—Had Wanted to Kill Oil King, Says Roommate

NEW YORK, July 4.—Dynamite exploding today while being made into a bomb, thought by night police officials to have been intended for the Rockefeller estate at Tarrytown, killed the bomb-maker, Arthur Caron, prominent in recent unemployed free speech demonstrations, killed three other persons and injured many, blowing out the south half of the upper three floors of a double-deck tenement at No. 1, 626 Lexington avenue.

The explosion shook that section of the city between 101st and 104th streets, Madison and 8rd avenue, driving thousands in panic to the streets. Falling walls buried many men, women and children under debris, from which the policemen and firemen dug the injured.

Following the identification of Caron's body, that of the agitator who had made the bomb, was found in a room on the second floor of the tenement. He had broken J. Robert Rubin, second deputy police commissioner, and had intended that the victim of his own bomb had attended a conference of an I.W.W. agitator and John D. Rockefeller, Jr., were discussed.

Question Room Mate. After interrogating Caron's room mate and others who knew the man intimately, Mr. Rubin and Inspector Schmittberger said it was possible that the dead agitator had been making a bomb to throw at the Rockefellers.

Michael Anstani, who first described himself as Mike Murphy, told the police he was asleep in the room shared by Caron and himself, when he was blown from bed by the terrific explosion. All the slightly injured, he managed to reach the street and wandered around in a daze until detained for interrogation.

After telling his story he slipped away, but was discovered later and taken to the East 104th Street Police Station, where for an hour he was examined closely by Mr. Rubin and Inspector Schmittberger.

MYSTERIOUS EXPLOSION IN ROCKEFELLER'S TOWN. Special to The Sunday World. TARRYTOWN, N.Y., July 4.—Investigation is being made to ascertain the origin of the explosion which wrecked the gas-manufacturing plant of the Westchester Lighting Co. in Josephine street here.

The explosion occurred when the village streets were crowded with commuters, who had to seek shelter from flying bricks. For two hours firemen fought the blaze and for a time it was thought help would have to be summoned from other villages.

Close by was the mammoth gas tanks of the Lighting Company, and the gasoline and oil tanks of the Standard Oil Company. Firemen kept streams of water playing on them continually.

The fire was in the heart of the shipping district of the village, and ferry and freight boats were obliged to leave the wharves for fear of destruction. The Dinkel and Jewell lumber yards was saved. Traffic on the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad was held up for a half hour while the firemen stretched lines of hose across the rails. The damage is estimated at more than \$100,000. Fire reaching the gas purifier caused the explosion.
