HUNTINGDON is stationary, if not worse; and will remain so  
until an united effort by preachers and societies place it in better  
circumstances to secure aggressive operation.

Unfaithfulness, associated with gross immorality, has brought  
reproach on the Church at INGERSOLL, and diminished its mem-  
bership; but the addition of members from the world during  
the year, gives a small increase on the preceding return. De-  
spite circumstances calculated to depress, the friends are hopeful  
as to the future of the Station.

The young but vigorous LAKEFIELD Mission is still prosper-  
ous, and full of promise for the future. A Parsonage purchas-  
ed, and a new Church in course of erection in the village, with  
a large amount of the cost of these already raised, are encour-  
aging; while the finances are steadily improving, the receipts  
of the year being fully equal to the disbursements.

LINDSAY.—This Mission, opened up since last Conference, has  
resulted in much good to the people, a gracious season of re-  
vival having given us, a large congregation, a prosperous S.  
School, and a membership of 94—where a year ago we had no  
cause whatever. A new church is ready for dedication in the  
village of Cambray. The prospect, at present, is all that the  
most sanguine could hope for;—may nothing arise to mar it.

The LITTLE PRAIRIE Mission, Wisconsin, as we see it, is so  
far a failure. Our Connexional *status* is very little, and likely  
to continue so. Our membership has diminished one-half in  
the past year.

LONDON.—Notwithstanding the removal of many names from  
the list of members, the return is 29 in advance of last year.  
A revival at Lambeth resulted in the addition of 25 to the So-  
ciety in that place. The S. School interest is encouraging;  
while the receipts have considerably lessened the debt on the  
Trust Funds, and met the expenses of the year under the new  
financial arrangement.

PERRYTOWN Mission is evidently improving. The Mission-  
ary reports that "about 50 have professed faith in Christ, which,  
after deducting those whose names have been removed, leaves  
an increase of 40 in the year." The finances have much im-  
proved also, and thus Perrytown, we trust, will soon begin to  
make return for the aid hitherto extended to it by this Society.

PICKERING has suffered much of late years owing to the  
breaking down of several of its Pastors; and again they have  
suffered from the same cause. One chapel has been bought and
