# Pledge to Belgium Renewed; Sham in Chancellor's Speech

"The determination of the Allies is that Belgium must be restored as a free, independent people; that Belgium must be a people, not a protectorate. We must not have merely a Belgium shattered by the Prussian sword. The sceptre must be Belgian, the sword must be Belgian, the scabbard must be Belgian, and

the soul must be Belgian. "I have read that speech (the chancellor's), as it was my duty to read it—once, twice, thrice—to seek anything in it from which we could hope for the end of this bloody struggle, and I see in it a sham independence for Belgium, a sham democracy

for Germany, and a sham peace for Europe. "And I say that Europe has not sacrificed millions of her gallant souls to set up a soil consecrated by their blood as a mere

sanctuary for sham. 'He (the chancellor) tries to stimulate and encourage his people by doping them with illusions. And Germany will find that her new hopes are just as much illusions as others which have been dispelled in the 'harrassing six weeks' that have just gone."-DAVID LLOYD GEORGE.

Hanna, food controller, has issued a statement, the most important item of which is the suggestion that no meat be served in hotels or restaurants on Tuesdays or Fridays and that no bacon be served on those days, neither on any other day, except at breakfast, and that at every meal there shall be supplied some substitute for white bread and that no more than two courses may be served for breakfast and luncheon, or three courses for dinner, the courses to be defined.
