Hopes To Defer Operation of Military Act For Five Years

Montreal, Nov. 2.—Paul E. Mongeau, an anti-conscriptionist, under arrest on a charge of violating the Military Ser-

vice Act, who has applied for a writ of prohibition to prevent Judge St. Cyr from giving judgment in his case, addressed a meeting last night at St. Mary's Labor Club. He expressed the hope, gathered from his lawyer's view of the case, that the proceedings he has taken will lead to a delay of five years in the operation of the Military Service Act.

No Furlough For 1st Contingent

An official statement, issued at Ottawa, announces that no action is being taken to bring back for a long furlough the men of the first contingent and that this cannot be hoped for as the exigencies of military service make it impossible.

Casualties
One hundred and fifty-seven thousand men have registered under the terms of the military service act. Exemption claims total 144,028 and reports for service, 12,975.

Mr. and Mrs. William Irvine have been advised that their son, Private Richard Irvine, a member of the 20th battalion, has been killed in action. He was a popular North Shore young man.

Casualties
Alexander Macdonald of Campbellton, has been advised that his son, Private Ernest Macdonald, had died while a prisoner in Germany.

For Flying Corps
Samuel M. Crawford of Lekeville, has been advised that his son, Sergeant W. Percy Crawford, who was wounded in the Somme engagement, is soon to sail for Canada.

On Thursday
A. Vernon Hatch, of this city, who was on the staff of the C.P.R. in Toronto, has enlisted in the Royal Flying Corps as a cadet.

Tablet Unveiled
On Thursday morning at early communion service in St. Paul's church, a tablet in memory of Reginald Heber Hamilton Daniel, only son of Canon A. W. Daniel, rector of the parish, was unveiled. Private Daniel was killed in action on August 16, 1917.

Norman A. Dobbin Wounded
Word was received yesterday by Mr. and Mrs. John Dobbin, of Rothesay, that their son, Norman A. Dobbin, had been admitted to hospital in England suffering with wound in the shoulder.

Ottawa List
The Ottawa list for the maritime provinces last night contained the names of three St. John men, Sapper J. A. McDonald, wounded; Gunner S. H. Penny, of 75 St. Patrick street, wounded, and Lieut. W. Walsley, gunner, Gunner Penny has another brother, Herbert J. Penny, also overseas. Among the list of missing is that of Captain Daniel Owen, of Annapolis (N. S.). Captain Owen is a newspaper man of renown having written many articles that attracted widespread attention, dealing with his native province of Nova Scotia.

NO COMPROMISE ON NIGHT 'PHONE RATES

The hearing of the application of the New Brunswick Telephone Company for permission to make their night rates effective only after 11 o'clock instead of

at 6 as at present was concluded last evening.

Before closing, Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, for the company, made a suggestion to the commission that the company would be satisfied to have the schedule changed from 6 o'clock p. m. to 8:30 p. m. instead of 11, but R. W. McLellan opposed this.

The evidence taken at the hearing during the afternoon session was largely of a technical nature and was given by Traffic Manager H. C. Gay.

H. W. Rising and J. A. Marvin spoke of the disadvantage which the new schedule would be to commercial travelers.

Ald. McLellan, after asking for a few minutes to discuss the case with those opposed to the new schedule, said he had no evidence to offer.

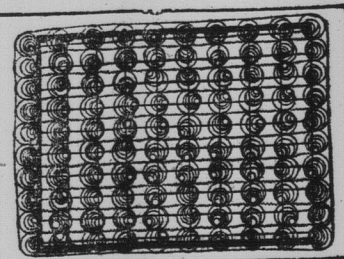
