Ottawa, Oct. 13.—Particulars of the composition of the new Canadian corps troops which have been added to the two Canadian divisions at the front received by the militia department by cable this morning. They will total about 10,000 men and bring the Canadian forces at the front up to the very considerable total of nearly 60,000.

(Continued from page 1.) Between Puywade and George Verté all summer, and a brother of Dr. Millar, late of Amherst, but now in France, has been sent as a private to the 6th, and has been in the hands of the Kaiser's army.

Ray H. Sawler is setting a fine example in enlisting as a private in the 88th regiment. He passed his examination and was accepted as a captain, and was offered a commission both in the 40th and in the 88th, but he preferred staying with the boys and enlisting as a private.

Norman C. Christie, of Christie Brothers and Company, is one of the volunteers who has lately joined the 88th regiment. Mr. Christie has given up a good position and a comfortable home to take his place with the young men who are enrolling themselves under the colors of the 88th.

Widow Greer Five Sons Mrs. Colburn, a Shiloh widow, has given five sons to the empire's cause. Some time ago three of the Colburn boys enlisted—Edward, for the 10th, and two others. All three are now on active service. At last week's recruiting meeting two more were recruited for the 88th—Robert and William. The names of the five sons are: Robert, William, Edward, John and Charles.

Another family in that part of Cumberland which is doing much for Canada and the empire is the Landry family. The enlistment of Fred Landry with the 88th last week means three brothers enrolled for active service.
