Doings of The Men In Khaki

Three Recruits Yesterday; Arthur Lammon May be Prisoner of War; What the Killies Will Wear

Recruiting thus far this week throughout New Brunswick is not very encouraging and greater efforts are needed if the province is to keep in line with the rest of the Dominion. Many young men are believed to be in expectation of joining the 28th Battalion. Many units are expected to be sent to the front.

Re Alive.
Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Lammon, 158 Metcalfe street, received a letter yesterday from Major C. H. McLean, of the 4th C. M. R's, expressing the hope that their son, Arthur, who was recently officially reported missing, might be still alive and a prisoner in Germany. Mrs. Lammon also received a letter yesterday from her son, William, who is a member of the Black Watch in Perth, Scotland. In his letter he says that he is well and in the best trained regiment in the British army.

Killies Uniforms.
The uniforms for the 28th Killies have been ordered from an English firm and it is understood that they will be here in a fortnight. The officers' uniforms will consist of a Balmoral cap with black feather, the bracket of which will be tipped in red, if the wearer has seen active service, plaidie, khaki doublet, kilt, belt, hair sporran, hose, dirk and spats. Non-commissioned officers and men will wear the same dress with the exception of plaidie and, instead of a hair sporran, they will have a leather one. The new pipes for the band are expected within a short time.

Two messenger boys of the local office of the Western Union office yesterday gave notice of their intent to enlist in the Field Ambulance and were given their discharge by the manager. One New Brunswick name appeared in the midnight casualty list, Edward May, Chatham, N. B., wounded.

A Prisoner.
Miss Bertha J. Conley, of 86 St. Patrick street, received a letter from each of her brothers, who went overseas with the Canadian forces. One, Pte. Walter, is a prisoner in Germany, and in his letter he writes that he is being used well, and none of the prisoners have any cause to complain. The other brother, Sgt. George Conley, also writes a cheery letter. Both soldiers are sons of David Conley and have been overseas since the outbreak of the war.

Lieut. Carr Killed Instantly.
The following extract from a letter received from Capt. W. C. Birrell, master of the 26th battalion, tells, under date of July 9, how Lieut. Frank J. Carr met his death at the front. The letter says:

"It is too bad about Frank Carr being killed. I went up to get some particulars from his battalion, which were sent out of the trenches only a day or so ago, and found Sgt.-Major Fraser. He said the Hun made a direct hit on the dug-out. Frank was in, killing him instantly. He never knew what hit him. "Frank was over here only six weeks and in that short time became very popular. Officers and men speak very highly of his work in the trenches."

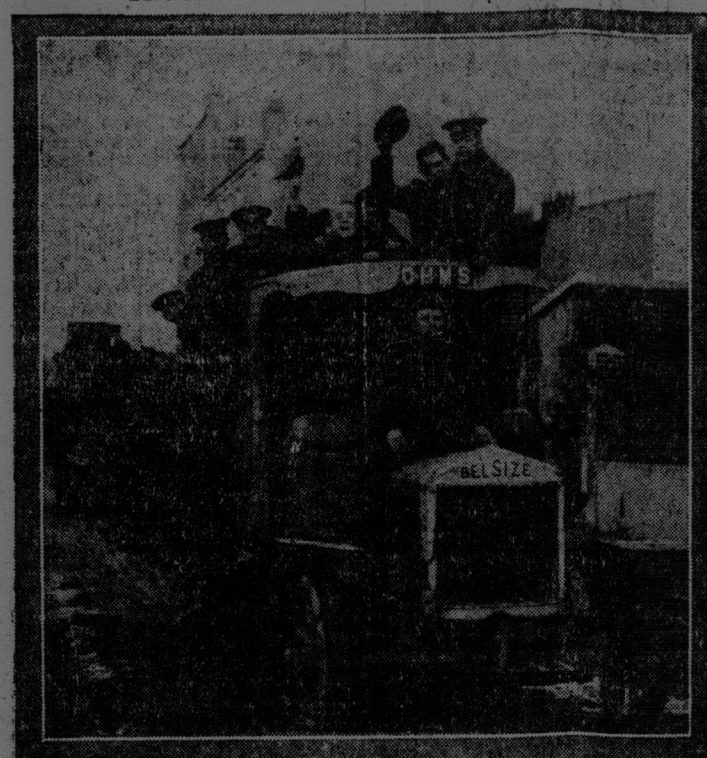

EVIDENCE AS TO THE DEATH OF JAMES A. RYAN

The coroner's jury empaneled to inquire into the death of James A. Ryan, at the General Hospital last Thursday evening, held its first session last night at the hospital. Three of the witnesses of the tragedy, roommates of the late Mr. Ryan, are yet confined to their beds. In the case of two of these their evidence was taken in their room but the condition of the third patient made it impossible to question him last night. The evidence of these two patients and several of the nursing staff was taken last night and adjournment was made until tonight when the court will re-assemble at the court house. Mr. Ryan died as the result of injuries sustained by falling or climbing out of his window in the hospital last Thursday evening. The jury empaneled by Dr. W. F. Roberts, coroner, was: James B. Daly, foreman; F. C. Beatty, J. P. Scannell, J. A. Kennedy, R. J. Walsh, John Thornton and Percy Steele.

The court proceeded to the room lately occupied by Mr. Ryan and there the evidence of two of his roommates was taken. L. A. Conlon appeared on behalf of Mrs. Ryan, widow of the deceased, while J. King Kelley, C. C. was present in the interests of the hospital commissioners. Dr. Thos. Walker and Senator Daniel, two of the hospital commissioners, were also in attendance through the session.

Evidence was given by John Boulter, Edward L. Heinle, patients in the same room, and the following nurses: Misses Maud Gaskin, Lydia W. Marvin, night superintendent; Alma F. Law, E. Stairs, Dorothy Merry, Emma Bell, Ada Foley, Cecelia Gleason, Marion Berry, Alice Guilfoill, Helen Vallis and Thora Berg.

TERRIBLY BURNED AS HER LITTLE BROTHER LAY DEAD IN AN ADJOINING ROOM

Boston, July 26—Little Mary Mulvey, six years old, was fearfully burned while at play in the kitchen of her house, 640 Harrison avenue, South End, and at the City Hospital it was said her name is on the dangerous list. The case is a particularly sad one. The child is the daughter of Mrs. Della Mulvey, a widow. Mrs. Mulvey has several small children, none old enough to do any work. In the front room lay dead Willie Mulvey, four years old. Mrs. Mulvey was lying down in her room at the time, having sat near the coffin of Willie all night. Little Mary not realizing the sad plight of her home, went around from room to room in play. She found some matches and set fire to her clothes. Mrs. Mulvey was awakened by the smell of smoke in the house and started to investigate. As she entered the kitchen she saw Mary's clothes afire. Mrs. Ellen Donovan, who lives upstairs in the house, heard the screams of Mrs. Mulvey. She helped to put out the blaze on the child's clothes and then notified the police and the little one was conveyed to the hospital.

No Secondor For His Resolutions

Deadlock Continues Over Proposals of Commissioner of Public Works; Common Council in Weekly Session

The regular weekly meeting of the common council which was held yesterday afternoon was marked by a continuance of the deadlock over public works matters. Commissioner Fisher's recommendations that the duties of the city engineer and the road engineer remain as at present being by order-in-council, that the city engineer's grade for First street be accepted, and that the bill relating to sidewalk obstructions, vesting the power to issue permits in the council instead of in one member, be given its first reading, all failed for lack of a secondor.

The sum of \$5,801, unexpended balance on King square paving, was allotted to Sheffield street sidewalks, \$801, and the balance to the widening of the corner at Mill and Main streets. The new water main in Hanover street, at a cost of \$600, was authorized.

The harbor commissioner was authorized to spend \$8,560 on west side dock repairs. The Union Foundry and Machine Works, Ltd., were granted the lease of two lots in the rear of their plant in West St. John for \$80 a year. The application of the Union Ice Company for the lease of two lots in the rear of their building in West St. John at \$40 each a year, was allowed to stand over until next week.

The council expressed its disapproval of the I. C. R. proposal to widen the Wall street bridge by a hanging sidewalk and requested that a new bridge be built.

The suggestion was made that dumping coal on the sidewalk in the principal streets be limited to hours when traffic is light.

Authority was given to engage Clarence Goldsmith, the waterworks expert, to advise re extensions to the local system.

A bond issue of \$1,000 for the purchase of fire alarm boxes, to the number of six, was authorized.

Bridges, superintendent of schools, were named as a committee last night at a special meeting of the building committee of the school trustees, to wait upon the government and put forward the request to be given authority to issue bonds to build the Douglas school to replace the present build Bentley street.

The need of a new school in New street was discussed at considerable length, but no action taken. The lone lasted over an hour and a half, like all committee meetings, it was behind closed doors.
