



LONDON, Oct. 15—An important advance in scientific knowledge is be-lieved to depend on the recovery of Professor Howard Maxwell Lefroy, now lying unconscious at St. George's

entomology and for some years has been searching for an insecticide which, while fatal to insect life, would be in-nocuous to human lungs. He has been experimenting with lewiste, which would have been used in the war if it had continued a few weeks longer, and is considered the last word in destructive gases. It is particularly dangerous as it is colorless, tasteless, odorless and almost impos-sible to detect if distributed as Lefroy was doing Saturday by an atomizer. No one knows the precise experi-ment on which he was at work, as he always is very reticent about his prog-ress, but it is believed he had reached the crucial point of his investigations, and returned Saturday evening, con-trary to his usual custom, for a few minutes to see how they were getting
