

EIGHT YEAR SUIT ENDS SUDDENLY

"Widow" Gets Evidence
From Sweden That She
was Never Married.

Boston, Oct. 31.—Eight years of litigation over workmen's compensation for the death of Carl J. Anderson, a carpenter, who died of injuries received in 1916, has come to an end when his supposed widow was proved, on depositions from Sweden, never to have been married to her "husband," although she lived with Anderson as his wife for 36 years.

The case involved suit and counter suits by the Fidelity and Casualty Company of New York in the interests of the supposed widow, Mrs. Christina Jonsson-Anderson, and Huse and Carleton, owners of the building at 108-108 Blackstone street, where Anderson fell into an elevator shaft and was fatally injured. He fell three stories.

Anderson died Sept. 27, 1916, at the Haymarket Relief Hospital. Mrs. Anderson was then living at 97 Revere street, West End. A December 1916 deposition before the Industrial Accident Board and claimed compensation as Anderson's widow. She testified that she married Anderson in Gottenberg, Sweden, Oct. 5, 1910, and had since that time lived with him at his wife's statements were supported by a man named Johnson. She was awarded \$10 a week compensation for 400 weeks, in all amounting to \$4,000. The compensation was paid to her by the Fidelity and Casualty Company of New York.

Sued Building Owners.

During 1916 she petitioned the Suffolk Probate Court to be appointed administratrix of Anderson's estate. Suit was immediately brought through her by the Fidelity and Casualty Company against Huse and Carleton, Inc., the owners of the Blackstone street building.

In the legal fight that followed the United States consul general and the consul at Gottenberg were called upon to secure depositions from the Rev. Briger Melstrom, assistant pastor of the Lutheran church in Norrbas parish, Sweden, and from Martin Ragnar Henric, an attorney of Gottenberg, concerning the marriage of the Andersons. The depositions secured from the lawyer and the minister on the records of marriages in Gottenberg and Norrbas parish were to the effect that no marriage had taken place as far as civil and church records showed.

Testimony Conflicting.

Judge Arthur W. Dolan, in a memorandum of opinion completed several days ago on the petition to set aside Mrs. Anderson's appointment as administratrix, said in substance that Mrs. Anderson's testimony had been conflicting through all the years of litigation and that she was not clear regarding any of the persons or places concerned in her marriage. In his memorandum he said:

"Marriage is an important factor with the people of almost every race and country. It is the individual's outstanding event. Whether entered into joyfully or regretfully, the picture of the event persists in the memory of the memory after many occurrences have faded away. On all the evidence I find that the bans or marriage were in fact never published, that the respondent was not legally married to the deceased and was not his widow at the time of his death."

Mrs. Anderson is reported to have been married again to a man named Carleton and is said to be living in Dudley. She was 54 years old at the time of the alleged marriage and is now 69 years old.

Final decision in the case will be given by Judge Dolan in probate court.

VESSEL TAKES 10,000 BAGS OF POTATOES

The steamer Sagaland, after receiving loading at No. 15 berth, Sand Point, sailed about 6 o'clock last evening for Havana, Cuba, with about 10,000 bags of potatoes, a consignment of boards, and some general cargo. H. S. Gregory and Sons were the stevedores and the rapid manner in which the ship was handled is responsible for the early sailing. The steamer was consigned to H. Kane and Co. The Sagaland is only one of many ships which has sailed or is to leave this port for Havana with potatoes this season.

Several Prince Edward Island shippers have sent sample consignments of Green Mountain and Red potatoes to England. The shipments are purely experimental and it is known that competition with Dutch and native potatoes will be a barrier. The embargo on potatoes from Canada which has existed since the war, was lifted this year.

The second C. G. M. M. steamer to load seed potatoes for Norfolk, Virginia, was expected at Charlottetown, P. E. I., yesterday. The Canadian Beaver, which left Charlottetown early last Sunday morning for Norfolk, took a cargo of 10,000 bags of seed potatoes, each containing 25-3 bushels.
