The Big League.

By defeating Philadelphia, New York assumed the leadership of the American League. Walter Johnson of Washington pitched the first no-hit no-run game of his fourteen year career and defeated Boston 1 to 0.

In the National League, Chicago won a fast and well played pitchers' battle from Cincinnati. Brooklyn made it three straight from New York and Rube Marquard held his former teammates at four hits. Playing the first game on their new home grounds, St. Louis was defeated by Pittsburgh.
