BALFOUR ON THE ECONOMIC SITUATION

Duty of British as Noted Statesman Sees It

Should Increase Industrial Strength Steadily - Matter of Relation to Some of the European Peoples.

(Canadian Press.) London, Feb. 13—Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, speaking on the economic position in the house of commons last night,


"I do not believe it possible for Europe to find rapidly and completely any remedy whatever. Whether, if the whole world were to join, if the countries which the war has left richer than it found them were to throw their whole worlds into exciting we this problem. weight into assisting us in this problem, some amelioration could not be effected, is another question on which I do not care to dwell. For us it seems to me to be our first duty and certainly not our only duty, to see that our great industrial society around which the whole security of Europe really revolves, remains with its existing strength intact and built up from day to day by the industry, economy and enterprise of the inhabitants of these isles.

"I will not suggest for a moment, however, that in doing this we are even however, that in doing this we are even chiefly to consider our own special solitary interests. We know quite well that now, as never before, Europe and the world are bound together by common interests and ought to be bound together by common interests and ought to be bound together by common ideals. If I thought any word of mine would carry into distant regions, the lesson I should like to preach to all these new nationalities which the war has created in eastern Europe would be that they also should consider, not mutual antagonisms and small ambitions, but should each in their own borders set to work by rigid economy pure administration and energetic labor to render their own economic position safe and honorable.

"We can only influence, only advise, we cannot command; therefore, I ask the house to support the government in what I conceive to be the only sound policy there is of stabilizing and strengthening our own economic system, using every accretion of strength to help those who most need help and not in attempting a task which is utterly beyond our powers and wasting, not only our own substance but our own powers of useful work and influence in the impossible task of managing for other people affairs which they seem incapable of managing themselves."

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SAYS RICKARD HAS SIGNED JACK

May Stage World's Championship Match Between Carpentier and Dempsey.

Paris, Feb. 11-Tex Rickard, American fight promoter, who staged the championship bout between Jess Willard and Jack Johnston, will put on the next world's championship contest be-tween Jack Dempsey and Georges Car-

pentier.

M. Descamps, manager of the European champion, after announcing today he had received assurance that Rickard had signed Dempsey, said he probably would sign with the American promoter as soon as he arrived in America early in March in March.

In securing the signature of the world's champion, Rickard has outdistanced Theodore Vienne, Charles B. Cochrane and William Fox, who made big offers for Carpentier's services, but were unable to get Dempsey's name on the agreement, he said. the agreement, he said.

Descamps left today with his charge for a week's exhibition in Monte Carlo, following which they are to take a tour of Italy. Before leaving, Descamps, in an interview, said he hoped with his statement to clear up the situation and permit the American fans to know the real situation


