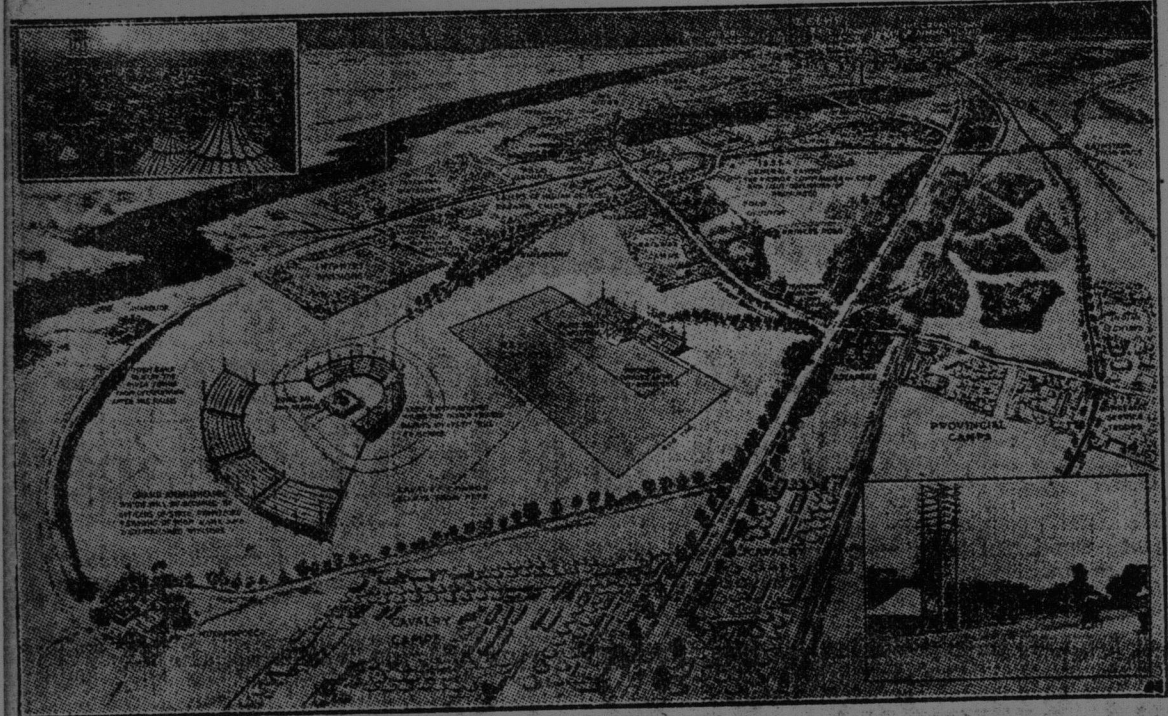


WHERE EMPEROR OF INDIA RECEIVED HIS CROWN

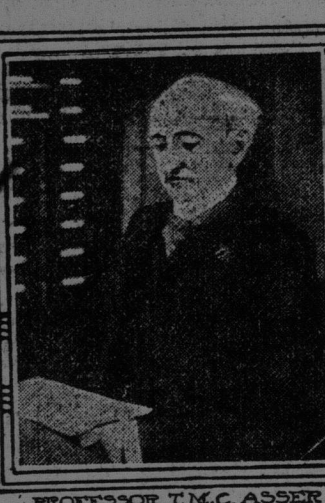
New Railroad Head.

According to a despatch from Christiania the Nobel peace prize has been awarded jointly to Professor T. M. C. Asser, a member of the Dutch Council of State, and Herr Alfred H. Fried, editor of the Vienna Friedenswart.

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MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRE

The electrical plant which will light the town and supply power for the water system of Edmundston, commenced operation last evening, the power being turned on by Mayor Dugal in the presence of a number of citizens. Power, to the extent of 720 h. p. is generated at the Green River, ten miles to the north.

Archbishop Hamilton, of Ottawa, Metropolitan of Canada, has issued a pastoral letter to the Church of England in which he says that, while Canada was never in a more prosperous state, the clergyman are the only class who have not shared in the prosperity, but who are worse off on account of the increased cost of living. He urges the churches to increase their stipends.

The Conservatives of South New Brunswick are calling a meeting to consider the selection of a candidate to oppose Hon. Geo. P. Graham. A large section of the party is in favor of keeping their promise to allow Mr. Graham to return unopposed in return for conceding the election of Mr. McGarry by acclamation.

The Duke and Duchess of Connaught attended the St. Andrew's Society hall in Montreal last evening. Yesterday they were much pleased with the drilling of the orphans in the Grey Nuns' Convent. Addresses were delivered in French.

Earl Grey has been elected president of the Peace centenary committee in London.

Sir Edward Grey in parliament in England yesterday made the statement that England had no intention of trying to gobble Persia, but he thought that in the best interests of all the American financial advisers, Morgan Shuster must be replaced.

The Russian foreign secretary is satisfied with the present grouping of the powers. Archduke Henry Ferdinand, brother of the Princess Louise of Saxony, has renounced his right to royal honors, and abandoned all idea of a military career, and the Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria has placed him on leave with "discharge of all emoluments."

He has married a Munich girl of lower life, and in this is but following the example of others of his family.

As a result of an investigation by the I. C. E. board of management into the wreck at Sackville Thanksgiving Day last, Driver A. R. Price, and Conductors Trueman and Melman are suspended for three months, and set back in the service two years.

Brakeman L. Stegman was suspended for three months.

Edmundston, N. B., Dec. 13.—Baptist Albert, who was accused of having set fire to the barn of Laurent Ouellet, of St. Basile (N. B.), was sent up for trial at the next Circuit Court to be held in March.

Montreal, Dec. 14.—Owing to the serious illness of Roland Moffat, with typhoid fever, his marriage with Miss Mary E. Malcolm, of Campbellton, has been indefinitely postponed.
