

POPE CONTINUES TO IMPROVE; CARDINAL RAMPOLLO ALSO ILL

Rome, Feb. 17.—Pope Pius X., continues

It was reported today that there would
be a reciprocal conference at the White
House tomorrow. Secretary Knox and
President Taft will both be present along
with a number of senators and further
pressure will be exerted in favor of the
measure.

Key Toronto
Toronto, Feb. 17.—The Toronto Board of
Trade, at a special meeting last night,
condemned the reciprocity proposals by a
vote of 32 to 1. The resolution was pro
posed by Sir Edmund Walker, President
of the Board of Commerce and seconded
by J. W. Flavelle. Several Liberal business
men supported the resolution.

A statement placing the Canadian Manu
facturers Association on record as opposed
to the reciprocity agreement between Can
ada and the United States was passed
without a dissenting voice yesterday at a
meeting of the executive of the associa
tion.

London, Feb. 17.—The tariff reform pro
gram is making the utmost capital out of the an
nouncement of the United States congress
to push the agitation for imperial prefer
ence. The editorial of these papers com
ment on the greatest tone on the alleged
danger threatening the empire. That sec
tion of the Unionist press, however, which
regards the policy of preference as killed
by the reciprocity agreement, takes like
the Liberal press, a high view of the mis
take. The policy of preference is not
merely as a move intended to embarrass
President Taft and prevent the ratification
of the agreement.

Another in Bank Case
Toronto, Feb. 17.—(Canadian Press)—
The latest development in the Farmer's
Bank case took place this morning, when
Inspector Duncan swore out a summons
for W. S. Morton, of Belleville. Morton
is connected with the Trust and Guaranty
Co. of which J. J. Warren is Presi
dent, and Hon. J. R. Stratton is Presi
dent. Morton is a very prominent Conservative
lawyer of Belleville. Morton, Stratton
and Warren are charged jointly with hy
pothection of the bank's notes contrary to
the bank act.

MARKET ROOM RENTS TO GO UP.
A meeting of the market committee was
held in the mayor's office this morning.
Matters regarding the remodeling of the
building were discussed. The tenants in
the eastern end of the building have been
warned out from May 1, and an archi
tect will be employed to prepare plans
and an estimate of cost of putting the
building in first-class shape. An applica
tion has been received from the For
sters for the lease of a hall in the build
ing, but no action was taken pending the
report of the architect. Rents will be
considerably increased after the changes
are made.
