That up to the jime of the confederation of the Provinces the rights thus reserved and secured to the said city and county were never questioned, but, on the contrary, were fully recognized and maintained in the year 1856 by the Gor-ernment and Legislature of New Ernwick, as will appear by reference to the revised statutes of the Province, passed in that year, chapter 91, sections 12, 13 and 14. That under and by virtue of the British North American, Act of 1867, and a subsequent Act of the Dominion Parlia-ment, viz., 31 Vic. Cap LXXV., the institution and promises above mentioned, passed over to the Dominion of Canada, and that from that hour the Dominion held that property, on exactly the same terms as the Province of New Brane-wick held the same at the time of transfer.
