HE LEAVES.

Marchand Has Quit Fashoda.

THE REST OF HIS FORCE WILL, LIKELY BE RECALLED—THE WAR SCARE ABATING.

Cairo, Oct. 29.—A boat, recently despatched to Fashoda, has reached Khartoum on its return journey, and Major Marchand is on board of her. It is added that the major deemed it necessary to personally bring to Cairo the unfinished portion of his report of his explorations. Capt. Germain was left in command of the French mission at Fashoda. Major Marchand left Fashoda on Sunday and arrived at Khartoum this morning. He will start for Cairo to-morrow. As the other Frenchmen remain at Fashoda, Major Marchand's departure from there is not regarded as a settlement of that place, which is in dispute between Great Britain and France.

THE REST WILL FOLLOW.
London, Oct. 29.—The morning newspaper editorials regard Major Marchand's movement from Fashoda to Khartoum as indicative of a yielding on the specific question in controversy, although the position is officially unaltered. It is assumed that he will push on to Cairo in order to be in direct communication with the French government, and that on reaching there he will report to Paris the impossibility of remaining at Fashoda under existing conditions, and will ask authority to withdraw his entire force.

ON HIS OWN INITIATIVE.
The Paris correspondent of the Standard says:—"I have excellent authority for the assertion, his own initiative, but that he will demand permission to withdraw the mission, since his men are dying of hunger and thirst. The special correspondent of the Daily News at Omdurman telegraphs:—"I have reason to believe that Major Marchand is waiting for instruction to withdraw the French mission from Fashoda."

WILL LEAVE THE QUESTION OPEN.
The Paris correspondent of the Times says:—"If France directs Major Marchand to retire from Fashoda, she will refuse to enter any ulterior negotiations, preferring to leave the question quite open and awaiting a more favorable opportunity to reopen it."

NO SETTLEMENT YET.
New York, Oct. 28.—Advice from Paris this afternoon say that President Faure has authorized the statement that no settlement has been reached between England and France regarding Fashoda.

THE ANTI-RITUALISTIC CAMPAIGN.
Proceedings have been commenced in the Consistory Court by John Kenait against the rector and church wardens of the Church of St. Eibellurg, London. The citation demands the removal of the crucifix over the altar, the tabernacle over the altar, and that the Ten Commandments shall be placed in a conspicuous place in the church. The proceedings will be resisted.

IN SELF DEFENCE.

IT ENDED IN A ROW

High Old Time at a Show in Tilbury.

Crowd Wouldn't Pay Up—One Young Man Got Thumped.

Tilbury, Oct. 29.—The Browbridge & Plumb Theatrical Co. presented "East Lynne" in Anderson Hall last night to a large audience, but before the evening was over several things happened which were not on the program. The trouble all arose when the manager made the announcement that there would be a ten minute intermission at the close of the production of "East Lynne." A prominent Tilbury East farmer rose in the audience and raised a kick, stating that he had paid 25 cents to come into the hall and proposed to stay there until the whole bloomin' show was over, without the payment of the extra ten cents. The suggestion appeared to meet the approval of some of the crowd, but in the meantime some young fellow, who was sitting next to the manager, announced that they wouldn't pay to deadheads—no money, no concert. When "East Lynne" was concluded the crowd all sat in their seats to await developments. The manager gave them just two minutes to pay or get out. The crowd did neither. After another weary wait the announcement was made that there would be no concert, and ticket-holders could get their money back at the door. In the heated argument which followed between the manager of the show and a Tilbury young man they came to blows, and the latter carried a large lump home, and a hen's egg on his head in consequence. Confusion reigned for some time and it was nearly midnight before the crowd dispersed. The manager of the show being escorted to the hotel by a constable. It is a matter of sincere regret that the entertainment ended with such an ending. While the performance was not quite up to the standard, it was at least worth the price of admission, and the majority of the crowd appeared satisfied. The management of the fancy fair going on in the hall this week, under whose auspices the entertainment was given, felt deeply grieved over the affair, but were in no wise to blame in the matter.

HARD TO GET BACK

After Getting Lambasted by the Essex Footballers

The Chatham Aggregation Could Not Even Get a Train Home.

It is said that the members of the football club had trouble of their own getting home from Essex last night. They went via G. T. R. to Belle River, driving thence to Essex, and had planned to return promptly the same way. They were informed that the evening train would stop for them at the Chatham town. The members of the team drove over from Essex immediately after supper and were horror-stricken when the agent told them that no train for Chatham would stop there until 10 o'clock the following morning. But the players were determined. The agent ascertained over the wires that none of the through trains could be stopped, but told them the Wabash express they expected to take would go through in a few moments. Two of the enterprising kickers secured a lantern from a neighboring hotel and shrouded it with a red sweater. With this danger signal they were preparing to march down the track and flag the express when the agent spied them.

A man once got two year's imprisonment for stopping a train that way," he said. "And besides they wouldn't take you on anyway." The confusion players abandoned their brilliant idea while the express thundered by regretfully and the genial agent promised to make things comfortable for the boys till morning. A BIG RUSH

Britain Rapidly Getting Ready

TO FIGHT FRANCE OR ANY OTHER NATION—A SECOND GIBRALTAR IN IRELAND.

London, Oct. 29.—The Daily News sent a special correspondent to ascertain the truth of the reported naval preparations at Portsmouth. He writes that the dockyard is full of unwanted activity, and echoes from end to end with the noise of preparations. Fifty torpedo boats and torpedo boat destroyers are being rapidly overhauled, and can be made ready for service in a few hours. Thousands of tons of coal are being poured at the TOPMOST SPEED.

into the bunkers of several vessels, and food and ammunition are going aboard as rapidly as the men and derricks can work. Outside the dockyard there is similar activity. Throughout the day there was a continuous boom on the coast, where the artillerymen were testing their guns. The forts at Spithead are taking in quantities of ammunition. The Southsea Common, close to Portsmouth, is dotted with tents which are occupied by engineers and miners who are erecting searchlight stations at breakneck speed. The earthworks all along the sea front are being strengthened, and there is evidence everywhere that preparations are being made for the worst contingency.

SECOND GIBRALTAR.
The English Government is fortifying Berehaven, at the mouth of Bantry Bay, Ireland. The work will take ten years to complete, and will, it is said, make of the place a second Gibraltar. It will be made into a strong naval base. It is an important place, as it lies on the direct route of food supplies from Canada, and the United States, and possesses one of the finest natural harbors in the United Kingdom.

MARRIAGE A FAILURE.

James Graham Fails to Support His Wife and Family.

James Graham, charged with non support, was before Judge Houston this morning. He admitted he didn't support his wife and family, but said that his health was bad. Mrs. Graham in evidence told a pitiful story. Graham's contributions to the home had not averaged ten cents per week and he had frequently stolen her goods to convert into money for whiskey. She was generally able to earn \$2.50 per week but had to pay the rent and support the father and three children.

"I'm afraid marriage has been a failure," commented Judge Houston. "Yes, a big one," was the unfortunate woman's response. Graham was remanded till Monday.

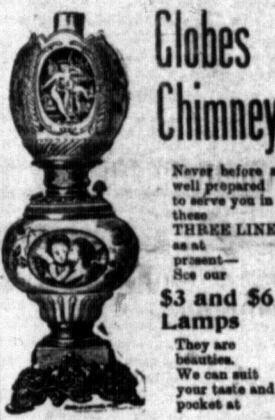
