

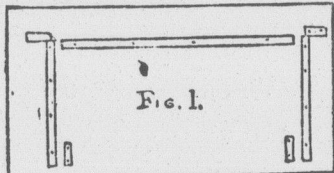


SIMPLE BROOD FRAME.

Description of One That Can Be Put Together by the Amateur Without Any Expense.

I have been working the past winter to devise a hive that would come within the scope of those possessed of ordinary skill and tools. By the time, however, that I could get a description of it in print, and a hive built from it, the time for its use would probably be past. I take it the part that will give the novice the most trouble is the brood frame, a description of which I give herewith:

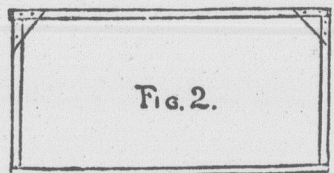
Take a board of suitable size and nail on some cleats, as indicated in Fig. 1.



Make a miter box the width of the frame—say seven-eighths or one inch. Nail a piece in the bottom of one end for a stop. From this stop measure off the length of the top rail, and saw down at right angles. For the bottom rail you can set in a loose piece about an inch thick, which will avoid two saw gashes coming too close together.

For the end posts make another gash at the right distance from the stop.

For the brace pieces you will need another box about an inch and a quarter wide. Nail in bottom of this a stop sawed at an angle of 45 degrees, and from a corner of this saw a gash of 45



degrees; shove it into the box to the stop, and saw it off; then turn it over, saw again, and so on, you will get the corner pieces.

As to construction, you lay the top piece in its place on the board, and the side pieces in their places, and nail on the corner pieces; then nail the top to ends and turn over and nail on bottom, and you have a strong frame, as indicated in Fig. 2, that will space itself in the hive and stay there. One frame will need braces on both sides to keep it the proper distance from side of the hive.

As regards size, authorities differ. I made mine 16 inches long because that was the length of four honey boxes, and nine inches deep, because that was the depth of the hive.—Richard D. Mitchell, in Country Gentleman.

Catching Rats on the Farm.

Set your steel trap in a corn-sack. Roll in the mouth of the sack until a space is left just large enough to contain the trap. The rat sees the ears of corn through the trap, and in reaching for them strikes the pedal with his nose. The trap is thus sprung so as to catch him just behind the ears, and his death is instantaneous. This is more humane than catching him by the leg and causing him to suffer all night. I have caught three successively in that way, and I believe it will prove successful in most cases. By the way, there is no surer way to rid the premises of rats than by using a sack partly filled with corn in the ear. You are sure of one about every night until they are exterminated.—Walter S. Smith, in Farm and Fireside.

What Subsoiling Does.

Moisture may be retained in the soil by subsoiling, plowing, harrowing, cultivating, mulching, rolling and by the addition of humus or decayed vegetable matter. Subsoiling increases the depth of clayey and compact soils and allows more water to enter them instead of running off on the surface. Subsoiling is thus an important means of preventing washing, and it also enables the roots to penetrate deeper thus increasing the feeding area. Both spring and fall subsoiling are of advantage on a stiff, heavy land.

Fertility from Roadside.

On a very much traveled road there is a great deal of excrement dropped from the horses used in drawing vehicles and from other animals driven thereon. Most of the soluble parts of this excrement are washed into the ditches on either side of the roadway. They accumulate in all the depressions and make a strata of rich soil, which is well worth the labor of drawing into adjoining fields as a fertilizer. It is best to do this while the field is plowed, and the roadside should also be plowed and cultivated, so that the rich soil can be evenly distributed over the surface.
