CONSUMMATION OF
BAPTIST UNION TODAY.

Two Churches Formally Combined This Morning---

Dr. McLeod Moderator of United Baptist

Church of New Brunswick.

The meeting at the Waterloo street

Baptist church this morning was a re-

markable one for the good feeling

which reigned. There was no hint that

any belonged to a denomination about

to go out of existence, but rather there

was the feeling that their work was

just beginning.

The service this morning began at

ten o'clock with the singing of the

hymn, "Arise, my Soul, Arise," and

prayer by Rev. Mr. Hutchinson and

Rev. C. T. Phillips. The hymn, "All

Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," was

then sung.

The meeting was called by the joint

committee of the two churches. Dr.

McLeod acted as chairman, and Dr.

McIntyre as secretary. There was a

large attendance. Enrollment was first

proceeded with, a committee being ap-

pointed for the purpose. While this

was being done other hymns were sung

and prayer offered by Dr. Gates, Wil-

liam Cummings, of Truro, ex-president

of the Baptist convention; Rev. E. C.

Crowell, of Yarmouth, and others.

The report of the committee on en-

rollment was read by Rev. Mr. McDon-

ald, of Fredericton, and adopted, and

while the roll call of the conference was

being read the list of the Baptist dele-

gates was made out. Some 80 delegates

from the church in this province

were found to be present. About two

dozen delegates from the church in other

provinces were at the meeting and

invited to assist in the work of the

house.

It was moved by Rev. Mr. McDonald,

of Fredericton, that all the members

at the conference enroll their names on

a register obtained for the purpose.

The reverend gentleman pointed out

that this was a historical meeting. The

resolution was adopted.

Rev. Mr. Marshall, of the Methodist

conference, was welcomed to the con-

ference.

Herbert C. Creed moved that a for-

mal resolution that the members of the

P. E. conference and the members of

the Eastern, Western and Southern

districts of the Baptist church constitute

themselves the Association of the Unit-

ed Baptist Church of N. B. This was

seconded by Rev. David Long.

Rev. Dr. Gates then moved that a

committee for the nomination be ap-

pointed, and the following were chosen:

Dr. McLeod, Vice; Rev. E. L. Stevens,

Rev. Mr. Brown, Rev. C. T. Phillips, Rev.

Mr. Hutchingson, Rev. Dr. Gates and

A. J. Prosser.

Rev. Mr. Hughes suggested that in

conformity with the custom in Eng-

land and the Baptist bodies generally

that district bodies be called associa-

tions and the provincial body a union.

This, however, did not meet with

the approval of the majority, and the

suggestion was dropped.

HIGGINS CONFESSES
HE KILLED DOWERY

He Admits the Crime to Fellow Convict.

Boy Murderer as Callous as Ever--He Expects to be Out in 5 Years

John Smith who about a year ago

last January was sentenced to two

years in Dorchester penitentiary on

the charge of breaking and entering into

A. G. Blair's summer residence at

Sand Cove was given his liberty from

the penitentiary yesterday and arrived

in the city as a ticket-of-leave man.

Smith was allowed his liberty about

three months before his full term

should expire on account of his good

behaviour while in prison.

Smith says that for nine months he

worked side by side with Frank Hig-

gins who is serving a life sentence for

the murder of Willie Doherty in Rock-

wood Park. He says Higgins is quiet-

down now but for some time acted

badly. Higgins often speaks of the

murder and in an easy way as if it

was an ordinary thing.

He has repeatedly told Smith that it

was he who murdered Doherty and

that once he got started on the crime

he could not stop half way but kept at

it till the finish.

Higgins expects to get out on a

ticket-of-leave in about five years

time.

It will be remembered that though

Higgins was convicted of the murder

of Willie Doherty the evidence adduced

was such as to cause much doubt as

to whether he or Goodspeed was the

murderer. Each prisoner accused the

other, and the chief reason for Higgins'

conviction lay in the fact that his

speedy story was told first and told in

a manner better calculated to arouse

belief than the other.

The statements quoted above, if

truthful, clear up one of the most

sensational murder mysteries of this

province.

The body of William Doherty was

found on Monday, August 4, 1902, in

Rockwood Park. Higgins and Good-

speed were arrested at Vanseboro on

August 9. The trial began on Septem-

ber 5, and Higgins was found guilty of

murder on September 24, and was sen-

tenced to death. Later his sentence was

commuted to life imprisonment.
