CONSUMMATION OF BAPTIST UNION TODAY.

Two Churches Formally Combined This Morning— Dr. McLeod Moderator of United Baptist Church of New Brunswick.

The meeting at the Waterloo street Baptist church this morning was a remarkable one for the good feeling which reigned. There was no hint that any belonged to a denomination about to go out of existence, but rather there was the feeling that their work was just beginning.

The service this morning began at ten o'clock with the singing of the hymn, "Arise, my Soul, Arise," and prayer by Rev. Mr. Hutchinson and Rev. C. T. Phillips. The hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," was then sung. The meeting was called by the joint committee of the two churches. Dr. McLeod acted as chairman, and Dr. McIntyre as secretary. There was a large attendance. Enrollment was first proceeded with, a committee being appointed for the purpose. While this was being done other hymns were sung and prayer offered by Dr. Gates, William Cummings, Thuro, ex-president of the Baptist convention; Rev. E. Crowell, of Yarmouth, and others.

The report of the committee on enrollment was read by Rev. Mr. McDonald, of Fredericton, and adopted, and while the roll call of the conference was being read the list of the Baptist delegates was made out. Some 80 delegates of the Baptist church of this province were present. About two dozen delegates from the church in other provinces were at the meeting and invited to send the "Key" of the house. It was moved by Rev. Mr. McDonald, of Fredericton, that the members at the conference enroll their names on a register obtained for the purpose. The reverend gentleman pointed out that this was a historical meeting. The resolution was adopted. Rev. Mr. McLeod of the Methodist church was welcomed to the conference. Herbert C. Creed moved that a formal resolution that the members of the F. B. conference and the members of the Western and Southern two districts of the Baptist church constitute themselves the Association of the United Baptist Church of N. B. This was seconded by Rev. David Long. Rev. Dr. Gates then moved that a committee for the nomination be appointed, and the following were chosen: Dr. McLeod, Rev. E. L. Stevens, Rev. Mr. Thuro, Rev. C. T. Phillips, Rev. Mr. Hutchinson, Rev. Dr. Gates and A. J. Frosser. Rev. Mr. Hughes suggested that in conformity with the custom in England and the Baptist bodies generally that the districts be called associations and the provincial body a union. This, however, did not meet with much favor, and the suggestion was dropped. The nomination committee, then reported and the following were elected by a unanimous vote: Rev. Dr. McLeod, moderator; Rev. Dr. McIntyre, secretary; and E. W. Ellop, treasurer. Dr. McLeod spoke a few feeble words, marking the occasion.

OLDEST EMPLOYEE OF I. C. R. DIED TODAY.

Warren W. Price, Station Master at Petticoat—He Has Been on the Road Since It Was Opened.

(Special to the Star.) MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 10.—A familiar figure on the Intercolonial railway passed away this morning when Warren W. Price, station master at Petticoat died at three o'clock after an illness of some months. Deceased was one of the oldest employees of the I. C. R. service, having been on the road ever since it was opened and few men in Canada have been engaged in active railway work for a longer period. He had been station master at Petticoat for something like forty-five years and was well known, not only to employees but to the travelling public. Mr. Price started in the railway service when the line between St. John and Point du Chene was known as the European and North American Railway. He worked at the construction of the road and built Annapolis and other stations between St. John and Moncton. He was about 77 years old, and is survived by Mrs. Price and a large grown-up family. Two of his sons, C. W. Price, train dispatcher of this city, and B. B. Price, locomotive engineer, Campbellton, are well known employees of the I. C. R. Other sons are Dr. O. B. Price, dentist, of this city, and Horton Price, of Sydney. He also has five daughters.


BABY MURDERED IN FREDERICTON.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 10.—Fredricton had an unpleasant sensation sprung upon it this morning. Two young boys, while playing about the dump back of city hall, discovered a bundle of carpet, securely wrapped up. On examination the bundle was found to contain the remains of an infant. It did not take long for the report to spread and the authorities were at once communicated with. Coroner McEwan was summoned and was soon on the spot. The body was that of a young baby girl fully developed and had died since being born. From all appearances the child had been strangled before being put in the bundle. The infant had not lived long and it is probable that the remains had not been on the dump for more than four or five days, as they were in a good state of preservation. The finding has caused quite a sensation about the city and there is a strong feeling that the guilty party or parties will be located. Coroner McEwan will hold an inquest tomorrow evening at York Hotel.

FREIGHT BLOCKADE HITS N. Y. GRAIN EXPORTERS.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—The Journal of Commerce says: Grain and flour exporters of New York just now are undergoing one of the most severe experiences in their trade's history. They have bought largely in the west, contracted for delivery on the other side and have engaged berth room on finding sailing steamships, yet on account of the car shortage or blockade at Buffalo vessels are sailing without cargo and large losses are being suffered. Traffic officials of the railroads constituting the trunk line association at a meeting yesterday with the grain committee of the produce exchange made definite promises to at once relieve the grain freight blockade at Buffalo which is so seriously affecting the export business at New York.

He Admits the Crime to Fellow Convict.

Boy Murderer as Callous as Ever—He Expects to be Out in 5 Years

CANON ROBERTS DYING; HIS SONS SENT FOR.

SALE OF I. C. R. EXPECTED

Senator Donville arrived from Montreal today, where he has been in the interests of his railroad. The general senator says that the talk in Montreal is to the effect that the government will shortly sell the I. C. R. This seems, he says, a settled conviction among railway people there. Personally he declined to express an opinion on the question.

KINGS COUNTY COURT.

(Special to the Star.) HAMPTON, Oct. 10.—At the opening of Kings county court today Judge Wedderburn and Hon. A. S. White made feeling reference to the late Mrs. William Doherty, who had died on Monday, August 4, 1902, in Rockwood Park. Higgins and Goodspeed were arrested at Yaneborough on August 8. The trial began on September 2, and Higgins was found guilty of murder on September 24, and was sentenced to death. Later his sentence was commuted to life imprisonment.
