**FOUGHT FOR THEIR LIVES 100 FEET UNDER GROUND**

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—Eight tunnel workers fought for life tonight 100 feet below the surface of the earth in a cavern of the Hudson Tunnel Company's terminal at Fulton and Church streets. Below them was a fountain of murky water, rapidly filling the narrow chamber in which they had been at work. Above them was a tightly air lock. Through this lock only one man could go at a time. Each wanted to be the first to escape the crush of water. Every one of the eight was injured in the fight on the ladder leading to the opening. One man reached the airlock. Two men seized him by the legs and pulled him into the water. Two men fell on top of them and for a moment things looked serious. For fifteen minutes the men fought, finally being rescued, bruised, but not seriously hurt.

**FRIGHTENED TO DEATH BY EXPLOSION OF METAL**

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 10.—Albert Lindsay was frightened to death and two men were severely burned by an explosion of molten metal in the finishing plant at the Baldwin locomotive works today. Frank Sakotovsky and Patrick Dolan were burned about the face and body by the hot metal which flew over them and Lindsay, who was standing near, was so frightened that he collapsed. He was picked up unconscious and when taken to a hospital with the injured men was dead. He was 48 years old.
