### IN THE POLICE COURT

Lawrence McLean who has been charged with stealing \$97.00 from George Simmons has been committed for trial by Magistrate Hubert. He has not yet elected as to whether or he will take Speedy Trial before Judge Hayward without a jury or be tried by a Judge and Jury at the next sitting of the Supreme Court which will be held here in April. No further steps have been taken in connection with the charge for breaking jail.

Gifford Goldie who is charged with the same offence was again remanded until Friday of this week, after some evidence had been taken on preliminary inquiry.

Albert Nadeau, Emmanuel Nadeau and Charles Eugene Pelletier, who were arrested in connection with the recent jail break were charged with assisting a prisoner to escape from jail and pleaded guilty when brought before Magistrate Hubert. As it appeared that they did not realize the severity of the offence which they had committed and had been induced by Michaud to do it on the assurance that it was no crime, they were sentenced to one year in jail and the sentence suspended.

Jans Michaud who was arrested in connection with a seizure of contraband liquor by the Provincial Police and who escaped from jail and later gave himself up to the sheriff pleaded guilty to the charge of having in his possession contraband liquor of a value greater than \$100. He was given the maximum penalty, a fine of \$500.00 and six months in jail. No further steps have been taken in connection with the charge of breaking jail which has been laid against him.

Francis and Johnny Aubin were before the Magistrate this week on informations lodged by Inspector Perron of the C. N. R. Detective Force charging them with stealing five brooms of a value of \$5.00. They pleaded guilty to the charges and were sentenced to one month in jail and the sentences suspended.

### IMPOSSIBLE TO OBTAIN QUORUM TO HOLD MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

**Town business at a standstill — Danger of damage being done to dams and power plant.**

A sufficient number of aldermen were not present to form a quorum at the regular monthly meeting of the Council which was supposed to have been held on Tuesday evening. Two special meetings were called during the month of February at neither of which a quorum was present, the Mayor and four aldermen or five aldermen being necessary to form a quorum, and Thaddeé Martin, James Martin, T. M. Richards and George Ringette being the only ones to attend. In the meantime it is impossible for the Council to transact any business, and among the urgent matters that should be disposed of are the appointment of an assessor and the arranging for the placing of piers and booms at the dams on the Green River in order that the logs from the New Brunswick Railway Company lands may go through the dams in the spring without being held up or without doing any damage to the dams. The Council have been advised that they are responsible for the providing of a clear passageway through the dams at all times, and in addition to that there is also the danger that considerable damage may be done to the dams and power plant if the passageway is not provided and the logs jam in front of the dams.

A petition asking for the passing of the Bill in connection with the Hydro Electric Commission, signed by four of the aldermen on behalf of the Council has been sent to Fredericton and will be introduced into the legislature this week.

According to recent press dispatches the electoral district of Restigouche-Madawaska has been honoured by having its representative, Mayor, selected to second the address in reply to the speech from the throne in the parliamentary session which opens on Thursday of this week.

We feel certain that Mr. Cormier will do justice to the high honor which has been bestowed on him. He left for Ottawa on Tuesday evening.

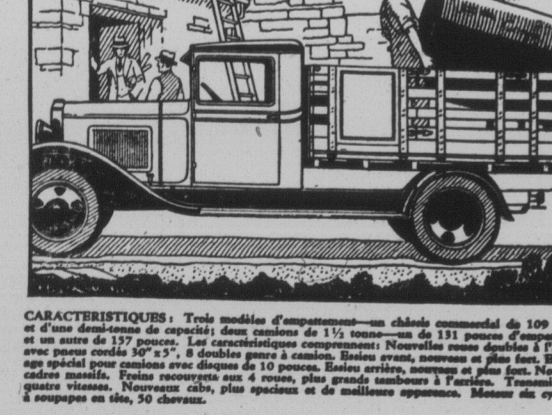
