APPOINTMENT COMMITTEE TO PREPARE COMMISSION PLAN

Meeting Called by Board of Trade Adopts Report of Advertising Committee - Difficulties to Scheme Urged by Some of the Speakers - Committee of Ten Nucleus for Larger Body.

The meeting called by the Board of Trade for the discussion of the plan of government by commission was held in the Assembly rooms of the Nickel Theatre last evening, and was attended by about three hundred. No great amount of enthusiasm was manifested, and it was apparent that outside of the members of the Board of Trade, who were behind the plan, very few of those in attendance were sufficiently familiar with the subject to discuss it. Consequently there was but little discussion.

President Estabrooks, of the Board of Trade, who was elected chairman of the meeting, was careful to explain that the plan proposed was not a skeleton, and it was for the committee appointed to enlarge upon it. The work to be carried on was largely of an educational nature, and it was hoped that public meetings would be held when there would be an opportunity for full discussion of all the phases of the question. The principle of government by commission as adopted by the Board of Trade, was adopted by the meeting, and a committee of ten members appointed as the nucleus of a committee of fifty to be thoroughly representative of all sections of the city, and all lines of business, professional and other interests. This committee will prepare full information as to the details of the scheme and work out plan to be submitted to the people for a plebiscite. They will also undertake the holding of public meetings, and in short act as sponsors of the idea.

In opening last night's meeting Mr. Estabrooks said that the plan proposed was not correct when applied to the scheme of government which the Board of Trade had been investigating. Government by commission meant government by an appointed body, as the name was taken from Galveston, Texas, where government by appointed commissioners had been carried on after the Galveston floods. The plan which the board had been studying into provided for the election of the commissioners by the people. He then related the steps which had been taken leading to the calling of the present meeting. He declared that the Board of Trade had not been hasty in announcing the commission, as the plan could not come into effect for a year from April.

In Ninety-four Cities. Ninety-four cities in Canada and the United States now have government by commission, and 140 cities and towns were applying for it. Personally, he thought it was the only plan under which the city could be properly governed. It was largely a matter of system, of men giving their whole time to the city's business, and not to the management of the city's business without salary. He believed it was the best plan.

On motion of Dr. Thomas Walker, H. Estabrooks was declared chairman of the meeting, but he declined. The Board of Trade had no desire to control the meeting. D. B. Pidgeon agreed with Mr. Estabrooks' views. Dr. Walker contended that all had confidence in Mr. Estabrooks whether he was president of the Board of Trade or not. He had been voted in to the chair and he would see to it that A. O. Skinner said the first business was to elect a secretary. S. A. M. Skinner was accordingly appointed.

The board of trade's plan was then taken up section by section. The first section provided for a mayor and four commissioners, by a majority of A. E. Hamilton, seconded by H. B. Robinson and carried unanimously. The second section provided that the mayor should hold office for two years and the commissioners for four years each with terms so arranged that there would be two new commissioners every two years. A. O. Skinner moved the adoption of the section and Mr. Jones seconded it. Dr. Walker said the section should be amended so that commissioners should be eligible for re-election. J. W. Eastwood moved in amendment that there should be no property qualification for the commissioners. Mr. Eastwood's amendment was not seconded and Mr. Estabrooks said that was a matter of detail to be considered later. The section was then put and adopted. A. O. Skinner moved the next section, providing for the double election system for commissioners. He declared that there would be two new commissioners every two years. A. O. Skinner moved the adoption of the section and Mr. Jones seconded it. Dr. Walker said the section should be amended so that commissioners should be eligible for re-election. J. W. Eastwood moved in amendment that there should be no property qualification for the commissioners. Mr. Eastwood's amendment was not seconded and Mr. Estabrooks said that was a matter of detail to be considered later. The section was then put and adopted.

VERDICT OF \$150 IN AUTOMOBILE CASE. A verdict of \$150 for the plaintiff was the result yesterday afternoon in the case of Margaret Louge vs. Geo. H. Waterbury, et al., and Geo. H. Waterbury, Jr. The jury found in answer to questions that the plaintiff was struck by an automobile owned by one of the defendants and driven by the other, while she was walking along the sidewalk on the south side of Union street on the 4th of January, 1910. In answer to the second question whether having regard to the number of foot passengers and vehicles then in the vicinity the auto was, in their judgment, driven at a dangerous rate of speed, at or immediately before the time of the accident, three jurors found that it was, and four that it was not. In answer to the third question whether the junior defendant was guilty of any, and what negligence in driving the auto along Union street prior to, or at the time of the accident, four jurors found that he was not and three that he was.
