TOURIST ASSOCIATION  
IN ANNUAL SESSION

**Suggestion Made that Associa-  
tion Should Provide Amuse-  
ments to Keep Summer  
Tourists Longer Time in City**

The annual meeting of the New Brunswick Tourist Association was held yesterday afternoon in the rooms of the association. The president, F. B. Ellis, presided.

The annual report of the secretary was read and adopted. The report showed that the association has been active, and that the number of tourists visiting the province during the past season was large. The finances for the year were found to be satisfactory.

The president, in his annual address said that the railway and other transportation lines reported tourist traffic good last year, and that the number of visitors to the province is increasing each year. He announced that the committee which has in charge the preparation of the provincial booklet, have begun work. He referred to the excellent work of the secretary and announced that the provincial government had secured space at the Sportsmen's Show to be held in New York, March 1st to 9th, and that the association will be represented at the show.

Col. Sturdee in speaking of the work of the association for the coming year, pointed out the urgent need for more attractions and amusements in and around the city proper. While a large number of tourists visit St. John during the summer and autumn, they do not remain long here as the number of attractions is limited, and in consequence, the tourist traffic moves to other places. A large touring automobile for conveying tourists in their sight-seeing excursions would prove a more suitable conveyance than hackbuses. He also suggested that if owners of motor boats could be interested in the scheme excursion around the harbor, and along the shore as well as up the river would become a popular and profitable undertaking. It is part of the association's work to not only bring people here, but to try to keep them here as long as possible.

The association could indirectly aid in securing more attractions. The extension of the street railway out Millidgeville would afford an opportunity to tourists to take in the scenery along the Kennebec.

The election of directors for the ensuing year was then proceeded with and the following were chosen: D. R. Jack, T. H. Bullock, F. B. Ellis, A. C. Currie, E. T. Sturdee, T. G. Dowling, S. B. Bustin, W. E. Foster, R. B. Humphrey. These will meet in a few days to elect five others. The officers will be chosen later by the executive.

The matter of changing quarters was discussed at length, and the decision was left to the committee which has the matter in hand.

The secretary, Miss Tinsley, will probably resign a portion of her salary this year at the Sportsmen's Show in New York and arrangements will be made for her to visit Portland on her way.

MORAL AND SOCIAL  
REFORM COUNCIL

**Annual Meeting Decided to  
Press for Revision of Pro-  
vincial Law Dealing with  
Liquor Traffic**

The moral and social reform council held their annual meeting under the presidency of Rev. Dr. Flanders, in the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon. When committees were appointed to bring a revised liquor act before the provincial legislature and to look into the matter of a juvenile court. A committee was also appointed to see that the different moving picture houses do not present obscene films. This committee however, was appointed only as a precaution as the society has no fault to find with the class of pictures that are now shown. The officers for the year were elected.

This society is made up of representatives from the churches and those present at the meeting yesterday were as follows: Anglican church, Bishop Richardson, Rev. W. H. Sampson and J. S. Armstrong; Baptist church, Rev. Miles McCutcheon, Rev. W. Camp, Rev. Dr. Hutchinson, Rev. P. H. Wentworth, J. W. Kierstead and A. A. Wilson; Presbyterian church, Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, Rev. H. Reid, A. W. Robb and Andrew Malcolm; Methodist church, J. W. Smith, C. H. Hinchings, Rev. Dr. Flanders, Rev. H. E. Thomas, Rev. Wm. Lawson, Rev. H. D. Marr and Rev. Wilfred Gaetz; Roman Catholic church, J. J. Mitchell, M. E. Agar and Thomas Kichham.

The first business that was handled by the society was the amendment to the liquor license act, which was discussed at some length and finally a committee consisting of J. W. Smith, J. S. Armstrong, A. A. Wilson and W. R. Robinson was appointed to present the bill to the legislature.

The question of juvenile courts was the next to come up, but because of the absence of Rev. W. R. Robinson who has the papers in connection with this branch of the work, the subject was not fully gone into. A committee however was appointed as follows: M. E. Agar, Judge Forbes, W. R. Robinson and A. W. Robb.

The committee to look after the moving picture houses is as follows: Rev. H. E. Thomas, A. W. Robb and M. E. Agar.
