

THISTLES WIN THE TROPHY; THE BONSPAIL A SUCCESS

The big Royal Caledonia Club bonspiel, held by the New Brunswick branch is being finished up early this morning. The Thistle Club have captured the trophy presented by Andrew Blair of Edinburgh, Scotland, which is to be won three years to entitle the club to become the owners. They also captured the beautiful shield presented by John A. Sinclair, the president of the New Brunswick branch, and this becomes the property of the club.

Yesterday morning two Thistle rinks on the St. Andrew's ice, defeated Fredericton in the doubles, while two Sackville rinks defeated Moncton on the Thistle ice. This left the Thistles and Sackville to play off for the prizes in the afternoon. There was a large crowd of spectators in the rinks all the afternoon watching the playing which resulted in both Thistle rinks winning handsily from the Sackville players. The Thistles won the trophy and shield and the Sackville players each receive prizes for being the runners up.

There was also a match in the singles on the St. Andrew's ice during the afternoon when Skip W. A. Shaw, of the Thistles, defeated J. H. Hawthorne of Fredericton and put the latter out of the Thistle club. In addition to winning the trophy and shield each player of one of the winning rinks received a watch fob presented by E. A. Smith, the president of the St. Andrew's club, while the players in the other rinks received souvenir pins presented by F. P. Burpee, the president of the Thistle club. The Sackville players who won second place, received eight emblematic pins presented by E. L. Rising, the vice-president of the St. Andrew's club.

The prizes in the single competition are, for first prize, four emblematic medals, presented by M. Lodge of Moncton, and for second prize, four emblematic pins, presented by C. H. Ferguson, the secretary of St. Andrew's club.

The most exciting finish of the day's play was last night when Skip W. J. Brown of the Thistles battled with S. D. Simmons of Fredericton in the fourth round of the singles. Brown had been leading until the thirteenth end, when Simmons went one in the lead. On the fourteenth end Brown, by a nice draw, tied the score and an extra end had to be played, and with another nice draw shot Brown scored one on the end and won the match amid great applause.

W. A. Shaw in his third round de-

feated the Moncton rink skipped by J. Edwards, and this game was finished about eleven o'clock and he was slated to play the fourth round with Skip S. Roxborough of the Carleton club. The ice was getting soft and the Shaw rink was pretty tired after playing steadily all morning, afternoon and evening, while the Carleton rink had not played a game during the day. Some of the members of the Shaw rink protested that as the game was between two city rinks it could be very well played at a future date, but Carleton were on hand, having been ordered to be on hand, and any protest did not go with the executive and the Thistle men had to play and the two rinks started the fourth round at 11:45 o'clock last night. Skip Brown's rink was waiting at the rink this morning until the finish of the match to play Roxborough for the finals should he defeat Shaw, and if such takes place the game will not finish until nearly 4 o'clock this morning.
