# CLARENCE WARD PASSED AWAY

Mayor's Clerk found dead in bed-Was an authority on Civic History.

Clarence Ward, Mayor's clerk, grand son of a Loyalist, and for a lifetime a consplcuous figure in the life of St. John, passed peacefully to rest in his sleep at his home, 23 Paddock street, early yesterday morning, aged '77.

Mr. Ward did not respond to the usual morning call of his household, and it was some little time before realization that he had gone to his long last rest forced itself upon his ong last rest forced itself upon his amily. Medical aid was, of course,

Mr. Ward had not been enjoying robust health for more than a year. During a visit to Chicago just about twelve months ago he was troubled with a form of gout, but upon recovering from this ailment, evidences of heart weakness developed. During the last week Mr. Ward had been distressed a great deal, but, strangely cough, gave signs of recovery on lesday, and it was his intention to esume his duties in City Hall yesterday. After midnight he was about the house as usual, and, being a very late worker at his literary labors, appeared quite bright and free from indisposition.

Mr. Ward leaves a widow, daughter of the late James Anderson, for so many years dean of newspaper work in St. John, and two children, Mrs. Jones, wife of Dr. O. V. D. Jones, of Chicago, and Miss Clare Ward, of the staff in the Inland Revenue department, Customs House. The only surviving member of his parential family is Mrs. T. George Cracknell, wife of the curate of the "Little Church Around the Corner." New York City. Mrs. Cracknell only a few days ago returned to her home after paying a three-weeks' visit to her brother. Mr. Ward was a member of the Mr. B. Historical Society and a lifeong Mason on the roll of Albion Lodge. Although prominent in the life of the city, he was most retiring in nature and cherished the quietude of his study and the championship of his books and research work to activities to which he was being constantly invited. His columns in the St. John Globe each Saturday were not only of great interest to the community and in fact to the whole province, but constituted a fund of historical data invaluable to students and persons having an appreciation of such information.

While the late writer did not produce any extended finished works, his pamphlets, newspaper contributions, etc., were numerous. Up to the time of his death he was engaged in writing ar

the time of his death he was engaged
in writing an exhaustive history of
the City of St. John, due chiefly to
the insistence of His Worship Mayor
Frink, who realized that Mr. Ward's
zervices should be secured while it
was possible. Anent this work, Mr.
Ward told a friend a few days ago
that he thought it would make a
tremendous volume judging from the
patter already collected and covering
very comparatively brief space of
time in the early history of the city.
Those who knew Mr. Ward best held
him in the warmest esteem because of
his young heart and bithsome disposition. He was jocular and cheerful
with everybody, and although the oldest member of the City Hall staff, he
was the very life of it. By the younger
generation he was revered as a
staunch friend and help-mate; whenever asked for historical information,
a service he was always most enthusiastic in giving.

Mr. Ward received his early education at the St. John Grammar School
and at Windsor, N. S. (King's College). His young manhood was spent
in his father's employ, and later he
was of the staff of James Chubb at
the historic corner on Prince William
street. As Mayor's Clerk he has been
a central figure in civic affairs for
twenty-five years. In his younger
days, Mr. Ward was on most intimate
terms with the various celebrities who
visited St. John in the halcyon days
of theatricals and was an authority on
the entertainment history of the city.
