Newark Team Proved Winners

Alfred Goulet and Eddie Madden Won Six Day Bicycle Race at New York Which Ended Saturday Night.

Ned York, N. Y., Dec. 6.—Alfred Goulet and Eddie Madden, the Newark team, won the six-day bicycle race at Madison Square Garden, which ended at 11 o'clock tonight.

Second place went to Oscar Egg, of Switzerland, and Marcel Dupuy, of France; and third to Reggie McNamara, of Australia, and Jake Magin, of New Jersey.

The teams had covered 2,501 miles and one lap in the 143 hours, as compared with the record of 2,625 miles set made by Dupuy and Egg in 1916. The prize money for the winning and other teams follows: First, \$5,000; second, \$4,000; third, \$3,500; fourth, \$3,000; fifth, \$2,800; sixth, \$2,000; seventh, \$1,500; eighth, \$1,000; ninth (Buyse and Spelsien), \$500.

Plenty of Offers For Jack Dempsey

English Promoter Offers \$175,000 for Dempsey to Meet Carpenter in London—New Orleans Man Offers \$150,000, While Paris Will Give Any Amount Asked for.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 7.—Cochrane, the English boxing promoter, has offered Jack Dempsey \$175,000 to meet Georges Carpentier, champion of Europe, in London, according to a telegram from Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, to the Associated Press.

Kearns, who is in Los Angeles, where Dempsey is filling a motion picture contract also announced that Tor-

toric, the New Orleans promoter, had offered \$150,000 for Dempsey's

end to meet Carpentier there. Kearns

has also received a cable from M. Decol, manager of the Wonderland

Sporting Club, of Paris, saying that

he was ready to deposit in the New

York branch of a French or British

bank, or in any American bank in New

York, whatever amount of money Jack

Dempsey asks for a twenty round fight

with Carpentier on July 14 in France.

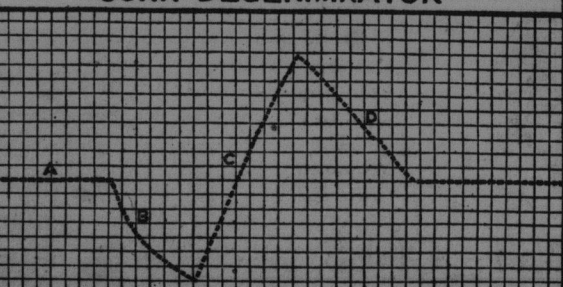

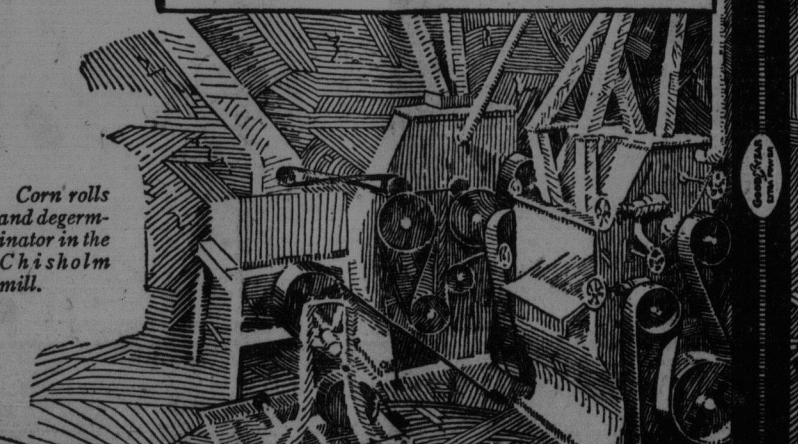
