To the Editor of The Standard:
Many news items have appeared from time to time in reference to the road work carried on by the present government under the supervision of the Hon. Peter Veniot. The writer, on behalf of himself and the other residents of this district, would respectfully draw the attention of the public and the Hon. Minister to the condition of the road running from Cole's Island up the south side of the Canadian River. The road itself is almost impassable in many places. But I would draw the Minister's particular attention to the bridges.
The bridge at Wilson's has been out of commission for three weeks. The bridge at Rankin's is in a very dangerous condition, especially at night, many bad holes, and its shaky condition, also no railing at places, make it very unsafe. Also the bridge crossing Percipine Brook, at West's, is gone altogether, compelling people to travel around a considerable distance. No motor cars can get up or down. This state of affairs has been reported to the Hon. Dr. J. D. Hetherington, who has made many promises to attend to it. But up to the present time he has done nothing.
The residents of this district do not expect a fine macadamized road, but they have the right and do expect a road safe to travel on in order to get their provisions up and down the river.
I might mention one case in particular of a doctor attending a patient by this road. He comes as far as Wilson's, and is obliged to leave his car by the roadside and hire a horse to take him on to his destination. These conditions are certainly disgraceful, and I trust this publicity may be the means of getting some relief for the residents of this long neglected district.

SOVIETS ORDER ALL TO CUT WOOD TO PREVENT FREEZING

Even With That Petrograd Has Less Than One-Sixth of Supply for Winter.

Petrograd, Sept. 24.—Facing a severe northern winter without supplies of fuel the Soviet rule has mobilized the entire population of the capital for the purpose of cutting wood for the winter. Men, women under fifty years and children over twelve are withdrawn from their usual occupation and forced to give five days' labor to the state as woodcutters. Even by this it is estimated only one-sixth of the fuel necessary to keep heat of Petrograd this winter has been secured. The exposure of the city dwellers to the cold winds will, it is expected, result in widespread sickness, as the most inefficient clothes are not water-proof.

PLANS FILED.

The plans of the land purchased from the DeBary estate, better known as the Shamrock Grounds, have been filed with the City Engineer for his approval, and it is expected the deal will be closed up in a short time.

RUSSIANS LIVE IN GREAT FEAR OF GEN. WRANGEL

Success of Anti-Red Leader Marks Beginning of Lenin's Fall Says Airman.

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—The demand of the Soviet Government of Russia that General Wrangel's army in the south should disarm before they would discuss the terms of peace with Poland and the Allied Nations is ascribed to former commander of a flight in Wrangel's air force, who was in Ottawa today on his way to his home in Toronto.

Captain Anderson was with Wrangel for over a year and watched the reorganization of the non-descript mob turned over by General Denikin who was disastrously defeated by the Bolsheviks.

As a flight commander, Captain Anderson took no small part in Wrangel's advance against the Soviet forces in which the rich agricultural province of Taurida, north of the Crimea was captured.

Shatters Lenin's Power.

Captain Anderson declared that this advance marked the first sign of the decline of the power of Lenin and Trotsky, and undermined the confidence of their conscript soldiers. "Not one man in ten in the Soviet armies are Bolshevik at heart," Captain Anderson declared. "I have talked with many of them and they invariably state that they were forced to join under penalty of death. They had no food and it was a matter of existence to them."

Because of the Polish successes, following shortly after these of Wrangel, in the south, Captain Anderson predicted that the Bolshevik regime in Russia could not survive.

SUICIDE BURNED THREE BARN.

Quebec, Sept. 24.—As a result of a sudden attack of insanity, Joseph Girard, of Notre Dame du Rossier, Montmagny County, ran amuck on Wednesday night, set fire to three barns, which were destroyed, and committed suicide by shooting himself through the head.
