Advance Guard of 200 Reach Lima on Way to Amazon Headwaters.

Lima, Peru, Sept. 8.—A group of American farmers, comprising the advance guard of a colonization scheme gaid to invoive more than 200 farmers from the Western United States, arrived here recently on the way to the Pampa del Sacramento Valley along the eastern headwaters of the Amazon River, in northern Peru, where the colony is to be established.

The party is in charge of J. B. Schoenfelt of Okumuigee, Okla., formerly United States Indian agnt for Oklahoma Territory, who obtained, for colonization purposes, a grant of \$50,000 acres of agricultural and forestry lands from the Peruvian Government lass October.
