Visit of Prof. Robertson to Carleton County -- Rural School Idea Explained.

Telling of the visit to Carleton county of Professor Robertson, in connection with the establishment of a central school, under provisions of the MacDonald grant,

In addition to the establishment of a central school at Kingston, as a model, Professor, Robertson's scheme includes the introduction of manual training and nature study into the school work at, say five central schools, with a view to each one of these schools becoming a central school in the future. A traveling instructor will spend half a day each week at each one of those schools. That section of Carleton county between Hartland and Andover, will probably be chosen, in which five centres will be selected; Florenceville will be one. Prof. John Brittain, of the Normal School, will perhaps accept the position of traveling instructor in nature work. Of course Mr. Brittain's success as a science teacher is well known.
