

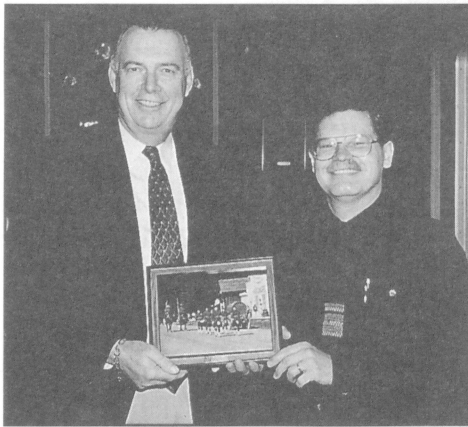
On August 1, 1874, what was then known as "A" Division under the command of Insp. W.D. Jarvis, split from the main body of personnel involved in the March West, in what would become southern Saskatchewan and struck out for Edmonton. "A"

Division is reported to have been composed mainly of sick and injured officers, with

supplies and stock not considered essential to the main body (six men from other Divisions, 12 half-breeds, 24 wagons, 55 carts, 55 sick or tired horses, 62 oxen, 50 cows and calves, agricultural implements and excess general stores including 25,000 pounds of flour).

The journey was difficult, with cold weather and a very rough, muddy trail, where one existed at all. Wagons had to be continually unloaded and manhandled out of the mud holes; livestock, feverish and thirsty, had to be hauled out of half-frozen ponds and sloughs with ropes. The Division of men and beasts arrived in Edmonton on October 27, 1874, in a state of near-collapse and were quartered inside the Fort for the winter. Next spring, Insp. Jarvis decided to set up his police post downstream from Fort Edmonton, at what came to be known as Fort Saskatchewan.
