It was Big Benny Gilbert who had the assignment to go out and do the animal taming and he did it in a clean cut manner. The Bengals secured two hits off his delivery and it is questionable whether he should have had that many charged against him. The drives were both of a scratch variety and one of them might have been better charged as an error against the fielder who juggled the ball in fielding it.

There have been many better played games seen on the local lot this season, particularly in the fielding way, but the fans were in a happy mood and tolerated the slips, particularly after the Beavers jumped into the lead with a rush in the fourth inning scoring three runs.

In this eventful period Kyle got a life on Carlin's juggling of a hard hit ball between first and second. Nicholson made three whiffs at the ozone and Beatty reached first when Shag dropped O'Rourke's low throw. Then up came Dick Wade, the slugging second baseman, who picked out a nice one and drove it to the backwoods for a three bagger.

Wade drove out his second three bagger in the seventh inning and scored when Shaughnessy dropped O'Rourke's thrown ball in fielding Hefter's grounder. Hefter took second on Scanlon's single and scored when Carlin mused up Rose's drive.

Saturday's battle was witnessed by a Cincinnati National League scout who watched Gilbert's performance with interest.

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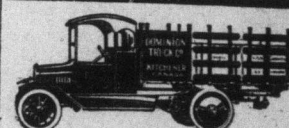

## THU CANADA WILL RATIFY

### Parliament May Sit U

UNTIL IT DOES, COULD NO TRADE WITH FORMER ENEMY COUNTRIES

(Special to The Record)

OTTAWA, June 24.—The question of the signing of the peace terms and the ratification thereof, is liable to have an important bearing upon the session of the Canadian parliament. Under the old condition of affairs, great Britain's ratification would have been good for the whole of the empire, but these conditions are changed, and each Dominion is a signatory to the treaty.

Just as soon as the peace terms are signed by Germany, the French government will dispatch copies to each of the countries involved for their ratification. Such ratification is to be made by parliament, and until each individual part of the empire engaged in the war ratifies the treaty, the anomalous position will exist of one part of the empire still being in a state of war while other parts are at peace. Bylaw to set apart the unincorporated village of Linwood as a police village.

## MANY PERSONS OF ALIEN BIRTH ARE ASKING PASSPORT

EXACT NUMBERS ARE NOT AVAILABLE

(Special to The Record)

OTTAWA, June 24.—Many applications for passports are being received from people of alien origin in the Dominion, by the passport branch of the department of external affairs. The applications include not only enemies of whom passports are refused, but men from countries friendly to whom have been fighting with the allies during the war. In the case of such latter classes, passports are only granted if they have been naturalized in the Dominion. Those who are not naturalized are referred to their particular consular agent.

A great many applications are being received from Italians, Armenians, Poles, Macedonians, Ukrainians and natives of various parts of Austria. As the department does not, however, classify applications according to nationality, the exact numbers are not available.
