St. George District Wants Power  
A hydro-electric meeting was held  
in St. George to consider the ad-  
visability of the Township of South  
Dumfries installing a hydro-electric  
system in the rural districts. Mr.

speakers. The farmers appeared deeply

extension of St. George system east  
of the Grand River and from Paris  
on the west side.
