

Take it from the girls, feline shinny is no powderpuff-league stuff

Used to be that women and hockey went together like a warm beer and a soggy pretzel, yet in the last ten years feline shinny artists have made their mark in many Ontario rinks.

This year three girls from the Mississauga Girl's "C" team attended the first ever Girl's Hockey School in Kingston.

Cathy Brown, a six year veteran, Cathy Scott, a 16 year old rearguard with four years under her belt, and 14 year old Michelle Borleau, who combines hockey and judo, trained for six days this summer under pros like Syl Apps Jr.

Curses say the purists. Girls in shinny are about as sensible as men in hot pants.

Too bad purists. Girls hockey is showing no sign of relenting. While last year the organization entered one team in Junior C play and one in D action, this year

could see two C squads plus three D clubs.

After the clubs started in 1963, when they played only exhibition encounters and fought tooth and nail for ice time, a South Simcoe league slowly evolved. Teams now have a 12-game season plus playoff and tournament contests.

Initially teams iced mostly older girls who had always wanted to take a crack at the sport. Now most players are in the 12-18 year bracket.

Cathy Brown, for example, started her career by playing road hockey with her brother. At 10, when she learned there was a bona fide girls team, she was one of the first to don skates.

Although not one of the three girls who would qualify as a tomboy, the trio were off to this summer's hockey school before most young ladies could sigh Rock Hudson.

There they drilled three hours a day on the ice plus

studied hockey strategy on the sidelines. Cathy Brown feels that if the girls continue to improve, we could see a women's semi-pro league some day.

"Some of the A teams play almost as good as the Dixie Bees," she says.

The ladies rely little on men to aid them in the sport except for the odd coach and club president Mike Palmer.

Palmer explains he was asked to take the presidency as the girls were having a tough time negotiating for ice time.

Palmer offers that "some of them are really good. They really get in and dig. I was quite surprised when I first saw them".

He will explain that girls are much the same as boys when it comes to starting hockey. They forget the positional end of the game and are "often nailed for offside."

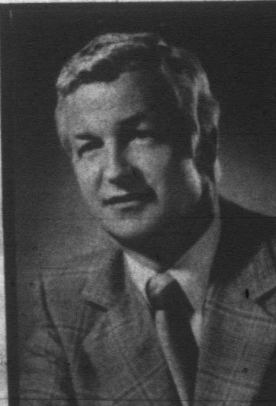
