was put upon Mr J. A. McDonald in handling the publicity, and it would appear that the county organization did not function with the energy and interest that is needed to win victories.

In spite of all the setbacks Mr Dinnin. Mr J. A. McDonald and his brother D. H. have shown a fine result to be proud of. These results bring into contempt the insane suggestion of W. C. Paynter in going to the Conservative convention with the idea that they should let the Progressives have the field. The returns so far show that Mr Dinnin had a majority in over half the polls. Nearly 2000, in the county proves there is a strong conservative sentiment, or one at least that is not prepared to accept the Liberal ideas as all gospel. This sentiment should not be allowed to lie dormant or go by default nor left in suspense until another election. The county has not had a conservative candidate for 14 years.

Suggestions.

My observation and experience fully convinces me that with greatly increased Conservative vote in Saskatchewan, the largest in its history, that the time is opportune to initiate organization plans that will win victories. Political conditions in this Provence are disastrous for a democratic country so vast and varied in resources, and so great in its possibilities.

The great mass of the conservative voters would readily pay a local memebrship fee for organization, education and publicity expenses. Hundreds more would gladly subscribe life memberships, and sustaining memberships. Some simple pland can be devised that would provide for a weekly or monthly periodical issued to the members for which they would subscribe at the time of their membershipk organization.
