## My dearMStevenson:

I will not attempt to write a letter of any length at the moment. In the midst of a lot of torture it is a real delight go get a letter from you. The enclosure of the sketch on W.L.Mc.K., which you sent, is a splendid piece of literature. The only thing that rather injures it to my mind is the coupling of Mr. Winsten Churchill with the hero of your story. As I understand the two men they are capable of contrast but scarcely of comparison. No doubt you have read Birkenhead's Contemporary Personalties. His review of Churchill's character accords very well with the estimate I made of the man in 1921. Churchill, of course, is aggressive; of that there is no question, but nothing counts for his success except down-right ability. The manipulation of friends or the conjunction of factitious circumstances have contributed really nothing to Churchill's place and achievemente.
