Another priceless possession of the S.P.G.-and one which causes American collectors 'to break the Tenth Commandment-is the White Kennet Library, a valuable collection of old books of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, which was given to the Society in February 1713, by Dr. White Kennet, then Dean, and afterwards Bishop, of Peterborough. It had passed through various vicissitudes then, and is much diminished, but still comprises about 300 volumes. The charter granted to the Society by William III., which, apart from its historical value, is quite a work of art, is also greatly prized.
