Bishop Greer recently held a Con-  
firmation in Grace Chapel, New York,  
when he confirmed 80 Italians, most  
of whom were men. Archdeacon Nel-  
son made an address in Italian. The  
Bishop preached, and his sermon was  
translated into Italian for the congre-  
gation by the Rev. M. K. Bailey.

The Easter offering at Grace  
Church, New York, amounted to the  
notable sum of \$158,500. This makes  
a record in the way of collections, for  
the whole of the United States.

The Most Rev. Dr. Davidson, Lord  
Archbishop of Canterbury, celebrated  
his 60th birthday on April 7th, and on  
April 25th (St. Mark's Day) he com-  
pleted 17 years in Episcopal Orders.

Seven very fine mural paintings of  
the Fra Angelico angels have been  
placed over the altar of Holy Trinity  
Memorial Chapel in Philadelphia.  
They were unveiled and dedicated on  
Easter Day.

A memorial altar and reredos lately  
erected in Christ Church, German-  
town, Pa., took place on Palm Sun-  
day, when the service was conducted  
by the rector, the Rev. C. H. Arnott.  
The altar, which has been placed in  
the church to the memory of Mr. W.  
J. Crowder by his widow, is of Caen  
stone, built in Gothic design and  
beautifully carved. The panels on  
either side bear appropriate inscrip-

former vestryman and superintendent  
of the Sunday School.

An addition is being built to the  
Home for Consumptives at Denver,  
which is a Church institution, which  
was founded thirteen years ago by  
the Rev. F. W. Oakes, and which now  
has accommodation for 150 people.  
It possesses a chapel where daily ser-  
vices are held and also a very well  
equipped Nurses' Home, which was  
dedicated by W. D. Hoane.

A memorial service was held in the  
American Episcopal Cathedral at  
Tokio lately in honour of the late  
Durham White Stevens, diplomatic  
adviser of the Korean Council of  
State, who was recently assassinated  
at San Francisco by a Korean zealot.  
The service was attended by the en-  
tire diplomatic corps and prominent  
residents of Tokio and Yokohama.  
Representatives of the Imperial house-  
hold were also present. The church  
was crowded. The English and the  
American Bishops and seven clergy-

men officiated. The floral decorations  
were beautiful.

At Emmanuel Church, Cumberland,  
Md., the rector, the Rev. W. C.  
Hicks, presented to the Bishop on a  
recent Sunday 70 candidates for Con-  
firmation. Of these 46 were adults,  
21 of whom had been baptized and  
trained in the Church, one was a Ro-  
man Catholic, whilst 48 came from  
11 different Protestant bodies, 32  
having been Methodists.

In its move to new and more ade-  
quate quarters the S.P.G. discovered  
some precious possessions which had  
been wholly or half forgotten. When  
the strong-room was broken up an  
old chalice and paten were found. The  
latter dates from the sixteenth cen-  
tury, and the former, although of  
much more recent origin, is more  
than a hundred years old. Both were  
used at the first celebration of the  
Holy Communion in the chapel after  
the opening of the new premises.  
The second find, of a half-forgotten  
relic, was the quaint little travel in-  
strument used by Dr. Schwartz on his  
missionary journeys. It has now  
been given an honoured place in  
Bishop Montgomery's room. Dr  
Schwartz's Bible and chair, and the  
actual palm-leaves found upon the  
martyred Bishop Patteson's breast,  
are placed in the chapel. They, of  
course, are not re-discoveries, but  
were recognized treasures at Delahay  
Street. Another priceless possession  
of the S.P.G.—and one which causes  
American collectors to break the  
Tenth Commandment—is the White  
Kennet Library, a valuable collection  
of old books of the sixteenth and  
seventeenth centuries, which was  
given to the Society in February 1713,  
by Dr. White Kennet, then Dean, and  
afterwards Bishop, of Peterborough.  
It had passed through various viciss-  
itudes then, and is much diminished,  
but still comprises about 300 volumes.  
The charter granted to the Society  
by William III., which, apart from its  
historical value, is quite a work of  
art, is also greatly prized.
