Prices worked steadily lower last week and at the close on Saturday cash wheat showed a decline of 31 cents and October 28 cents. The daily markets have been very dull with business limited almost entirely to the clearing up of old contracts. Better reports regarding the yield of winter wheat have caused an easier feeling, which has been increased by favorable reports on spring wheat conditions. Considerable interest has attached to the question of food control in the United States and Canada. A representative delegation of Western grain men has gone to Ottawa to confer with the government, presumably on this question.

Coarse grains also show a decline for the week. A poor demand for cash oats has been a bearish feature. Very large averages have been seeded to corn and oats, so that future requirements will likely be well provided for. There is also a fair volume of marketing by farmers since seeding.
