In the States they have a system which has been in successful operation for a number of years. In every town or village they have a set of signal flags being reported, a certain flag indicating the coming change is hoisted. The flags are of various colors and shapes and the public is supplied with charts showing what the various flags mean. If, for instance, a farmer is in town and sees the flag indicating a coming storm, he will naturally hasten home and escape, when otherwise he might be caught out in a blizzard.

Where there is a rural telephone, the system can be still more utilized by a general call from central to all the surrounding country.

Hoping that you will see the advantage of the scheme, it is the wish of this local executive to call the attention of your proper authorities, which in this instance I should surmise would be the government and telegraph companies in conjunction.
