BRAVE CAPTAIN OF CARMANIA

Tells How He Went to the Rescue of the Blazing Volturino.

LIVERPOOL, Tuesday, Oct. 14.—Captain Barr, of the S. S. Carmania, stood in the smoking-room of his ship at one o'clock this morning and told of how the passengers of the Volturino were rescued.

The Carmania arrived here at 11 a.m. Captain Barr was almost too weary to talk. He was heavily eyed. His face was deeply lined with sleeplessness and exhaustion. He smoked cigarettes nervously as he talked.

Several Boats Helpless. "It seemed a foolish thing to risk lowering the Carmania's boats in such a circumstance, but I felt that we had to make a try to help them. I thought of sending out four boats. My men were so eager to go that there would have been more than enough volunteers to man four boats. I was glad afterwards that I sent only one. It was dropped close to leeward."

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Terrible Mine Disaster At Universal Colliery, Wales

Over 400 Welsh Miners are Believed to Have Perished --Many Brave Rescues Made at Great Risk --Sad Scenes at Pithead.

An entrance was found, however, by way of an adjacent shaft and on descending in this manner the rescuing party came across some scores of men huddled together in portions of the mine where the ventilation was still good. Soon 327 living miners had been gathered together and taken up the shaft with the bodies of six of their companions who had been killed by being dashed against the uprights supporting the galleries by the explosion.
