Secretary Daniels Believes That Turks Who Fired Were Friendly.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 .-Definite details of the adventure of the cruiser Tennessee in the Gulf of Smyrna were eagerly awaited to-day by administration officials, who remained confident that the affair probably would be adjusted through channels of dipadjusted through channels of dip-lomacy. Ambassador Morgenthau had been directed to inquire of the Turkish Government why land forces had fired on the Tennes-see's launch as it steamed from Vourlah to Smyrna, to investigate conditions at the American con-sulate, and the commanders of the Tennessee and her sister ship, North Carolina, in nearby waters had instructions to make no move had instructions to make no move that might embarrass the Wash-

President Wilson was determined that the United States should not become involved in trouble with Turkey, and confidence was expressed that if the Turkish officers had acted without authority of their government, or the firing was unjustifiable by or the firing was unjusti naval procedure, that the Porte would apologize.

Secretary of the Navy Daniels summed up his view of the inci-dent by declaring he believed detailed reports would show that the firing was intended as a friendly warning to prevent the

'I believe that when Captain Decker's report is received it will prove that the firing was a friend-ly, and not an unfriendly, act," said the Secretary. "Reports that the waters of Smyrna harbor are mined indicate that the shots were fired to warn the vessel against the danger of mines which it might have come into contact with had it entered the harbor."

Another explanation advanced by Mr. Daniels was that the port had been officially closed, and caused the guns of the forts to sound a warning to prevent it from trespassing. 
