## SHELLING OF WHOLE LINE NEVER CEASES

Severe Damage is Inflicted, and Patrol Parties Bring in Prisoners.

500 SHELLS IN HALF AN HOUR

One Place in the Enemy's Positions Received This Amount of Attention.

London, June 29.—The War Office communication issued last night says: "During last night's operations the raids, and patrols entered enemy trenches at several points, bombing the enemy and inflicting casualties. Near Angri, one of our raiding parties found the enemy trenches badly damaged by shell fire. The enemy apparently had suffered from gas we had successfully discharged from our trenches, and a particularly successful raid was carried out by the Highland Light Infantry near the Vermelles-La Bassee road, where forty-six prisoners and two trench mortars were captured and two enemy main shafts were destroyed with the loss of only two men.

"Early in the evening a small mine near Neuve Chapelle and another near Hulluch, but excepting slight damage to one of our saps they achieved no other result. We successfully exploded two mines southward of the Bethune-La Bassee canal. Bad weather yesterday prevented much flying.

Very Destructive Bombardment. The Chronicle has the following from Philip, Ghent, with the British armies in France.

The steady shelling of the German line along the whole length of our front from Ypres to the Somme will continue, and beyond doubt the work of the guns is inflicting severe damage upon the enemy, apart from the numerous raids in which our troops have penetrated his trenches and brought back prisoners. The object of this artillery fire is a simple and terrible one. It is to kill German soldiers and to destroy his own man-power as well as possible; it is to destroy the enemy's batteries, to break up his defensive works; to prevent his making any progress in the line, to bring down his observation balloons, to reach his men in and beyond their communication trenches, in their billets, and rest camps, on the railways and generally to cause destruction to his offensive powers over a wide area.

British Gunners Successful.

I know from various sources that our gunners have been successful in many of those objects. At various points on the line from Neuve Chapelle southwards to the Somme our batteries have carried out concentrated bombardments with great effect; the work of the enemy which have looked down upon us from his kite balloons have been silenced; many of his gunners have been very severely wounded, and large numbers of important positions have been searched by our high explosives and shrapnel. Without moving a foot we have struck our enemy severely. That is all I know from information received in the northern as well as the southern sectors of our front.

500 Shells in Half an Hour.

From personal observation I know that the work of our guns has been very destructive. To-day I went to part of the line not far from Albert. The German lines stretched out before the British army, marked by well-known woods and landmarks, from Thiépval to La Boisselle and away to Tricourt. "I am glad I'm not in Thiépval," said an officer by my side, as we were looking across to the woods. There shells were bursting above them continuously, with the impression of a rain of black clouds for high explosives. In less than half an hour I reckoned that 500 shells had fallen over Thiépval, but that was only one place. All along the German line our shells were bursting. La Boisselle was being slashed with fire. Above Tricourt there was a continuous flash of bursting shells through the smoke which shrouded it. The enemy's reply was feeble, and only a few shells answered our batteries. It was day out for the British artillery and it was doing great damage to the enemy's lines. The infantry on both sides was invisible.

Munitions Output at Best.

Gabriel Mancaux, former French Foreign Minister says: "The allies' production of munitions is at last in full swing. The French output surpasses all expectations. The British is going ahead without a hitch, while one of my friends, who has returned from Petrograd tells me that the Poutiloff factories give the impression of being ten times bigger than the Creusot works. This production goes on simultaneously, so that an iron torrent may deluge the besieged Central Empires. The Russian battle has scarcely begun. Italy is reaping the reward of her energetic resistance and Cadorna's management strategy. She knows that Austria has no more reserves to feed the Trentino front.

In Macedonia Bulgaria is now thrown on her own resources. The allies' army is in perfect condition and will play its role in the Balkan Peninsula, which Austria has abandoned, perhaps forever.

The Berlin Claim.

To-day's German official statement says: "From La Bassee Canal to the region south of the Somme the enemy made reconnoitering attacks, in conjunction with intense artillery fire and mine explosions and under the protection of smoke and gas clouds. The attacks were repulsed easily."

## EDITOR ON STAND IN BOMB TRIAL

John Devoy Sent Telegram to Lawyer in Buffalo to Please Von Igel.

New York, June 29.—John Devoy, editor of the Gaelic-American, was placed on the stand yesterday at the trial of Von Igel and others, former German army officer, charged with complicity in the alleged plot to blow up the Welland canal in September, 1914. He was asked why he had sent a telegram to John T. Ryan, a Buffalo lawyer, requesting Ryan to identify Horst Von Der Goltz, the man upon whose confession, Fauscher, Wolf Von Igel and others were indicted. Ryan, it had been previously brought out, turned over funds, alleged to have been used in the plot, to Von Der Goltz.

"Von Igel asked me to recommend some one in Buffalo who would identify a friend of his," said Devoy. "I told him of John T. Ryan, a lawyer there whom I knew when he was a boy. I sent Ryan a telegram and that was the end of it."

When asked why he was willing to be responsible for a man whom he did not know, Devoy replied: "Von Igel told me he was all right and it was only a case of identification."

As he left the stand, Devoy turned to Judge Hand and said: "I want to contradict the villainous misstatement made against me by that man who calls himself Von Der Goltz." The court warned him that his words were "irregular."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent, also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$500 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 60 acres and erect a house worth \$1000.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of certain conditions. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
