Trades and Labor Council Recommended New Traffic Measure

Consideration of the inclemency of the weather, there was a fair attendance at the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night. A miscellaneous of discussions intermingled with frank opinions as to the responsibility of certain men in public office, including, of course, the weather man, and heart to heart talks of the gossip of the town was the order of business permitted.

After the usual preliminaries, Delegate McGrattan brought forward a resolution asking the Street Railway to keep the public rest on the Market Square open until the last car leaves the B.M.R. station. It was suggested that policemen look after the building after the work is done.

An invitation asking three representatives from the local Trades and Labor Council and one from each Trade Union attended the Trades and Labor Congress in Toronto on Good Friday of this year.

Communications from the Department of Justice state that the representations of the local Labor Council concerning the Frank Wilson case will receive immediate consideration.

As the business of the evening commenced to slow down, Delegate McGrattan moved that:

1. "Every vehicle drawn by horse or every hand cart or every horse-drawn carriage or every motor vehicle when on any highway of the city after dusk and before dawn shall carry a lighted lamp visible not less than two hundred feet to the rear of such vehicle."

2. "Every bicycle wherever used on any highway of the city after dusk and before dawn shall carry a lighted lamp."

3. "And that a copy of this resolution be sent to the City Council."

Here Delegate Crandall and the chairman engaged in a hurry over the extent of the "vehicle," the former believing that it included such articles as wheel barrows, go-carts, but withdrew all objection to the motion when rightly informed that the resolution was passed.

The industrial address of the president of the Board of Trade was then criticized, "Oriental Labor" and Mr. Ellis' views on this subject were aired. Delegate McGrattan said Mr. Ellis was wrong in saying that oriental labor, if employed during the war, could be sent back to Asia when peace comes.

We won't do it, he said, it will be impossible to do it in a hurry. Capitalistic labor, he said, seemed as though foreigners were getting the better mechanics' jobs all round, even when specialties being preferred to Canadian. Natural born Canadians found themselves impossible to employ at present conditions.

The speaker then protested against the pensions paid to returned soldiers, claiming them to be shamefully meagre. The number of unemployed last month was twice that of the month before.

The discussion was brought to a close, with "there is no shortage of labor" there is a shortage of cheap labor.

A municipal house-building concern operated on a straight business basis with no graft was advocated by Delegate Kye. A thorough discussion on this subject was not taken up.

The most talked of subject in all the public bodies of the city, "The Brant County Toll Road" was then discussed.
