## Two Cars Crash at D. A. R. Crossing

## Several Officials Badly Injured Near Bridgetown—Electric Storm Felt in Nova Scotia.

Bridgetown, N. S. July 24th.—A serious accident occurred at the Bridgetown crossing a train length east of the railway station about 11.30 this morning. A Dominion Atlantic Railway car containing the following railway officials, M. K. McQuarrie, chief engineer of the road; D. A. McDonald, travelling auditor; D. J. Murphy, general roadmaster, all of the D. A. R., and H. R. Mathewson, travelling passenger agent of the C. P. R., was running west as a special and blowing the whistle as usual at the crossings when an automobile owned and driven by Mrs. R. L. Lessell, was crossing north of the street. Mrs. Lessell evidently did not expect a special on the D. A. R., and her car was struck between the two seats, completely wrecking it and damaging that of the D. A. R. All the occupants were thrown out. Mr. Murphy is badly cut about the head and otherwise injured. It is thought he will recover. Mr. McQuarrie, the driver, is bruised and injured inwardly. Mr. Mathewson is also considerably bruised. Mr. McDonald was able to proceed on the west-bound express, while the others were being cared for at the St. James Hotel, medical aid being immediately summoned. Mrs. Lessell is somewhat bruised, but it is thought not seriously injured.

A big electric storm passed over Bridgetown at an early hour this morning, striking the Round Hill D. A. Railway station, seven miles west of Bridgetown, which was destroyed by fire.

## Trade Preference with the Empire.

## British Cabinet Affirms Scheme Submitted by Committee, Announcement by Colonial Secretary.

London, July 24—A committee of the cabinet has formulated a scheme of trade preference within the empire which the cabinet has approved, according to Walter Hume Long, secretary of state for the colonies, who spoke here today.

A dispatch from Quebec says that the steamer Celtic Prince, that went ashore near Father Point on July 8, was successfully floated Tuesday to Quebec. She is not badly damaged.

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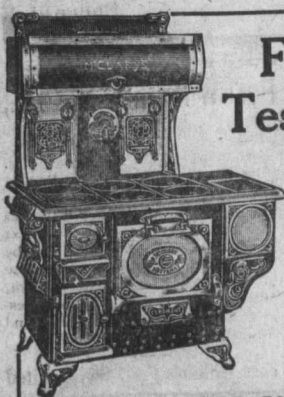
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
