The Fruit Division of the Dominion ! Department of Agriculture is just now giving a scries of orchard demonstrations in Ontarlo and Quebec to lliustrate the great advantages which follow the use of the power sprayer. At each farm the exrt sprayer will only require the sistance of a teamster, and thus the regular work of the farm need motibe interrupted. Under present methods every farmer in the fruit districts requires a spraying outlit of his own, and the spraying, if done at all, is done in a careless, half at all, is done in a careless, half-hearted way by men who do not know just when or how the work should be performed. Farmers are very busy at the season when spray-ing should be done, consequently it is often neglected entirely, or post-poned until too late to be effective. poned until too late to be effective. Farmers have reason to feel indebted to Mr. W. A. Mackianon, chief of the fruit division, for bringing to their attention the merits of the power sprayer. If the old methods of spraying were valuable, and it is generally admitted that they were, this new plan must prove infinitely better. The demonstrations given in many parts of the Province in 1901 and 1902 were uniformly successful in the Costruction of growing will mus-terd plants in g.owing oreal crops; and it is believed that the blue-scope treatment of mustard will be welcomed by hundreds of farmers throughout Ontario.

L. How the Buelstone if applied— Place an ordinary spray pamp, such as is used for the spraying of fruit as is used for the spraying of fruit trees, on a cart or light wagen; drive along slowly through the field applying the solution to the mustard plants in the form of a line spray. When the field is badly infested, it is advisable to spray the crop in strips in order that no mustard plants es-

In order that no mustard plants escape the spray.

If. How the blue-stone solution is made—Put nine (9) pounds of blue-stone (copper sulphate) in a coarse sack or bag, and suspend it in a vessel containing three (3) gallons of very hot or boiling water. The blue-stone will usually classolve in 15 or 20 minutes, Strain the solution into the barrel of the spray-pump, and fill up with cold water to make 40 or 45 gallons. This is known as the 2 per cent, solution, (1 pound of bluestone

gamons. This is known as the 2 percent, solution. (1 pound of bluestone im 5 gallons of water.)

III. When to spray the mustard on a calm, bright day, just as the plants are coming into bloom. At this time most coming into bloom. At this time most of the young plants have made their appearance; and all will be killed. Should a heavy rain come immediate-ly after spraying, it will be necessary to spray again.

IV. The cost of the solution—Com-

mercial blue-stone or blue vitriol costs at the drug store about nine or ten cents per pound. A barrel of the solution will therefore cost about

solution will therefore cost about eighty or ninety cents.

V. How much is required to spray an acre thoroughly?—A barrel of the solution is sufficient for an acre. Successful results are obtained when the spraying is done thoroughly.

VI. Are the crops in which mustard is growing hurt by the spray?—Experience shows that the young shoot barley outs or young clover

perience shows that the young wheat, barley, oats, or young clover plants are not injured beyond a slight browning for a few days by the blue-stone spray.

VII. Where further information

may be obtained—Should you desire,—further information regarding the treatment of mustard with bluestone solution write to the Biological Department of the Ontario Agricultural College.

Rice Cake.

A delicate rice cake for dessert may be made as follows: Put a pint of cold, iresh milk in a saucepan over a hot fire. When it boils add a heaping cup of well washed rice. Let the rice cook slowly in rice. Let the rice cook slowly in the milk for twenty minutes, then cool it in the saucepan for half an hour. Add sak heaping table-spoonfuls of sugar, and stir them in well. Then add three whole eggs and flavor with a tablespoonful of orange flower water or orange extract. Roll some good puff paste yery thin the a tin pudding mould, holding about three pints, with the paste; add the rice with the eggs, sugar and flavoring, and put the pudding in a mederate oven to bake for forty minutes. Then cool the pudding, cover it with an icing and serve. This makes a firm cake, which should be well flavored with orange extracted and garnished with a little acid jelly.
