PREACHING SERVICE.—Rev. S. B. Kempton occupies the pulpit of the Baptist church the second and fourth Sunday of every month—services commence at 7 o'clock.

SHIPPING.—The new schooner Beulah is loading potatoes for Havana, Cuba. Thirty cents per bushel is the prevailing price and Sheffield & Wickwire and C. E. Borden are the shippers. The treaty recently arranged between Spain and Great Britain on the most favored nation plan will be of immense benefit to us. Our potatoes, fish and goods, sent to Cuba and Porto Rico will now go in under favorable terms, in fact under the same conditions as if Canadian vessels were flying the Spanish flag. Certificates of origin and other papers will be required. Full information may be obtained at the Custom House here.

Schr. Marlon, Lyons master, sailed on Tuesday for Montreal, having about 400 bushels apples on board. The shipper was C. E. Borden. Apples have been and now are moving briskly and returns of the first cargo shipped to England, about \$200,000. Grapes range from \$2 to \$2 50, net. A few Ribon Pippins sold for 21c, which means about \$4, net.

The Resolution on her last voyage to New York carried beside a load of man-ny New York cartons and it is reported they sold for \$3 50, giving C. E. Borden, the shipper, quite a handsome profit—prices in U. S. do not range so high now.

The schr. Unexpeted, which arrived in New York about the same time as the Resolution, carried about 1450 bushels apples. She was loaded by W. H. Chase & Co., R. M. Rand, and Austen Kimball & Co. of New York.

The schr. Ocean Home, loaded by the same parties, sailed for New York about 10th Oct, carrying 2,000 bushels apples. The schr. Byron M., loaded by the same parties, sailed for New York a little later carrying about 1500 bushels apples.

The schr. Cygnus, loaded by C. F. Eaton at Millville, New York, 15th Oct, with 3500 bushels apples. Mr. Eaton has left for New York to look after the cargo.

The schr. J. P. Blake is loading potatoes at the Pickett wharf for the U. S. F. Eaton et al are the interested parties.

The "Grangers" are also preparing to load potatoes for the American market. Considerable success has attended their labors in the shipping business. One of the most prominent Grangers recently informed us that last year he shipped his potatoes at different times in vessels loaded by their society and they brought him netted lower than the former figure. Not so bad when one considers the reduced prices paid here by our more extensive shippers.

Schr. Unexpeted, Bartensu, is loading apples at Port Williams. The shippers are W. H. Chase & Co., and R. M. Rand.

Schr. Moelle is loading potatoes for the West Indian market at Port Williams. The shippers are J. W. & W. Y. Fullerton.

Schr. Alice, Baxter master, is almost loaded with potatoes for Havana, Cuba. Shippers, W. H. Chase & Co.

SCHOOL HOUSE.—The new school-house is approaching completion and will be ready for occupancy the second week in November having been pushed rapidly forward by Mr. Kuro, of Wolfville. It has been constructed for three departments and will, in all probability, be occupied this winter by the present teachers, Mr. George J. Miller and Miss Terry, with the addition of Mrs. Alice Burbridge, of this place, for the third department.

COUNCILLORS.—There is not any apparent activity as regards the coming election of Councillors. No one appears to have any interest in it, or at least, have business of more importance to occupy their attention, and it is not at all likely there will be a contest in this ward. It is rumored that one of our present Councillors, Mr. Daniel Cox, declines to be a candidate again. (Since writing the above it is reported that "Pereux" Grange is to put one of their number in the field.)

SAD DEATH.—John Roscoe Esq., who was so cruelly assaulted some time ago, died Tuesday morning from the effects of the injuries received. Colin Roscoe Esq., Inspector of Schools, is a son of Mr. Roscoe.

APPLE SHIPMENTS.—The total shipments of apples across to England so far this year have been 95,864 barrels against 82,215 barrels for the same period of 1885. Of this quantity Halifax has shipped 10,486 barrels, Montreal 10,396 barrels, Boston 31,537 barrels, New York 44,445 barrels. About three-quarters of this quantity has been shipped to London alone. In the next steamer, which is expected to leave Halifax to-morrow, and one that will leave the middle of next week, all the available space has been engaged by our apple shippers.
