The three masted schooner *Hattie May*,
Morris master, arrived on Saturday
from North Sydney, with coal for W.
H. Chase & Co.

It is rumored that Governor-General
Stanley has rented Oaklands, a residence
on the North West Arm, and that his
family will spend next summer there.

There is quite a boom in potatoes
just now. Mr Pitt is shipping a large
quantity in barrels and Earl street, where
he is storing them, presents a busy
scene.

The water is being put into a large
number of the residences of Wolfville
and it looks as though quite a revenue
would be derived from it in the near
future. It is certainly a great conven-
ience.

Mr Willie R. Buchanan, of Grand Pre,
has a 17 months colt, called "Duke
DeCharter," which weighs 1000. He
has also a six year colt, 5½ months old,
called "Highland Chief," which weighs
600.

The steamer *Acadia* arrived on Monday
morning and remained till evening in
order to get out her large freight. The
wharves were so full that her cargo had
to be discharged across other vessels
lying at the wharves.

In response to an invitation from
Archbishop O'Brien of Halifax, several
Acadian fathers have taken charge of two
Acadian parishes in Nova Scotia. The
intention is to open at once a college for
the Acadian youth of the province.

Hon. J. W. Longley is to lecture in
College Hall this evening under the aus-
pices of the Athenaeum Society, on
"Joseph Howe." The lecture is well
spoken of where it has been already de-
livered and no doubt a large audience
will be present.

The output of the Springhill collieries
for October will be over 520,000 tons,
which beats the record in Nova
Scotia. Of this quantity nearly 50,000
tons were shipped. About thirteen
hundred persons are steadily employed.
Work at the collieries is booming.

The schooner *Maids* arrived on Satur-
day from New York with a cargo of hard
coal and oil. She had a long and stormy
voyage and lost over a hundred barrels
of oil from her deck load. The oil was
owned by Shattford Bros. of Halifax, and
was for parties in Wolfville and Kent-
ville.

There was quite a large attendance at
the public meeting in Witter's Hall on
Friday evening last. On motion Dr.
Baron was appointed chairman and Mr E.
W. Sawyer, secretary. Mr Rand in a
somewhat lengthy address presented a
verbal report of the proceedings of the
commissioners. On motion \$10,000 was
voted to complete the work.

Old apple-trees are leaving places
for the better. No superannuated
trees should be allowed to exist any-
where on the farm. Crab-apple trees are
especially bad; in this respect we
repeatedly find them. We repeat, cut down every old, worn-out
tree, as a protection to the young
orchard.

The New York fruit dealers place the
average value of the entire apple crop of
New Jersey a dollar a barrel lower than
it would otherwise be, by reason of the
injury which the fruit sustained from the
codlin moth, producing what are com-
monly called "wormy apples." So much
for the work of one insect.
