The Legree of Horses.

Everybody remembers the infamous slave owner, Legree in "Uncle Tom's Cabin," who beat his more manly slave to death, and who received a well merited knock down from "Master George." His policy was to buy negroes, wear them out in two or three years and then replace them by new ones.
