The Canada Gazette publishes the order in council recently passed revising the wharfage tariffs of the Intercolonial railway superseding the existing tariffs as applicable to St. John, Moncton, Point de Chene, Dorchester, Newcastle, Chatham, Pictou Landing, Point Tupper, North Sydney and Sydney.

The sixth annual meeting of the Canadian Association for the prevention of Consumption and other Tuberculosis will be held in the Railway Committee room of the House of Commons on the 28th of March next. The Hon. Senator Edwards will preside in the afternoon.

In the evening a public lecture will be delivered in the Lecture Hall of the Norman school by Dr. Arthur J. Richer of Montreal which will be illustrated with stereoscopic plates showing the stages of Consumption and some of the appliances now in use to check and cure the disease. The chair will be taken in the evening by His Excellency, Earl Grey.

The lecture by Rev. E. R. Young in the Methodist Church on Thursday proved an intensely interesting and instructive. The lecture held the closest attention of the large audience for an hour and a half as he portrayed some scenes from his experiences as a missionary on the border land of the Eskimo. In the course of the lecture Mr. Young made the astounding statement that he knew there was gold as well as iron and other minerals in the far north, in fact he had brought some of the gold to a Toronto house and it had been pronounced pure. Mr. Young further stated that he would tell no man where the gold was to be found until the Indians had been sufficiently strengthened in the principles of Christianity to stand the impact with the greed of the gold seeker.

The recent thaw struck the Restigouche woods and lasted for about a week, but it did not tie up the work. The cut on the Restigouche is about the same as it was in 1905, and there is every prospect of getting out all the lumber without trouble, which means that a considerably large quantity of logs will be brought to the boom as about six or seven million of last years cut will be brought down.
