At the present moment, after a long reign of thirty years, we see the emperor of Russis forced to risk all his chances for the future upon a single card, with all the interests of morality, human progress, material improvement, and civilisation against him. Let him suffer one serious defeat, and he is lost? What has placed him in this position? Is it skill? Is it greatness?'
