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German Proposal Rejected.

Foch Refuses to Suspend Hostilities.

Revolution Spreading in Hunland--Kaiser Will Not Abdicate--Allies Capture Tournai.

GERMAN PROPOSAL REJECTED. LONDON, Nov. 8. THE GERMAN PROPOSAL FOR AN IMMEDIATE PROVISIONAL SUSPENSION OF HOSTILITIES HAS BEEN REJECTED BY MARSHAL FOCH.

WAR REVIEW. The terms of the Entente Allies, under which Germany may secure an armistice, have been handed to the German delegates at the French Army Headquarters at a little village in the Department of the Aisne, and a German courier now is speeding back to Spa, the German Headquarters in Belgium, with the document. Seventy-two hours, or until Monday morning, have been given the Germans to accept or reject the stipulations. Emperor William is said to be at Spa awaiting the arrival of the courier with the momentous conditions. The German delegates, it is said, endeavored to secure an immediate provisional suspension of hostilities, but Marshal Foch refused to acquiesce. Notwithstanding the fact that the abdication of Emperor William is generally believed to be conditional upon any terms of an armistice and the further fact that the majority parties in Germany have demanded that he quit the throne and that the Crown Prince renounce his rights to succession, the Emperor has refused to retire. Meanwhile throughout Germany revolt is in the air and the red flag is flying. A republic has been formed in Bavaria and in addition to Kiel, Hamburg and Schleswig, Bremen, and other ports, the great part of which is said to be in revolt, is reported to have fled to Schleswig. On the battlefields the Germans everywhere are being hurried backward to their borders. Tournai, an important railroad junction point, has been captured, and all along the front the Germans are being pushed farther east.

HAMBURG CONTROLLED BY THE REVOLUTIONISTS. AMSTERDAM, Nov. 7. The great German maritime port of Hamburg is completely in the hands of the revolutionists, according to reports from Hamburg newspapers printed by the Cologne Gazette. The red flag is flying on all the ships in the harbor. The headquarters of the commander of the port has been occupied by the Soldiers' Council after exciting occurrences, in which machine guns were used. All kinds of excesses took place in the neighborhood of Altona. The port commander there agreed to all the demands submitted by the Soldiers' Council.

SONDERBURG IN REVOLT. LONDON, Nov. 8. Sonderburg, a Prussian town in Schleswig, thirteen miles northwest of Flensburg, is in the hands of the revolutionaries, according to a despatch from Copenhagen to the Exchange Telegraph Co. The red flag has been hoisted on the shipping there.

GERMAN WARSHIPS. COPENHAGEN, Nov. 8. Some of the German warships from Kiel have arrived at Flensburg, in Schleswig. Their officers were navigating them under the command of the sailors. The German ports of Bremen, Hamburg and Cuxhaven are in the hands of the Soldiers' Council.

TWO HOURS' WORK. AMSTERDAM, Nov. 8. The Cologne Volks Zeitung says the revolution at Bremen was effected in two hours. The marines enticed the soldiers to join them, after which a

meeting was held. The assembly demanded the creation of a Social Democratic Republic. Women joined with the marines in opening the prisons. Order is being maintained by the marines.

OFFICERS CONSENTED. LONDON, Nov. 8. The movement which resulted in the seizing of virtually the entire German Navy by revolutionary forces, was carried out in a fairly peaceful manner, according to the Exchange Telegraph correspondent at Copenhagen. At Wilhelmshaven the naval officers agreed to hand authority over to the rebels if they would promise to make resistance should the British attack that naval port.

THE FAITHFUL FEW. LONDON, Nov. 8. A Berlin wireless despatch received here to-day says the third squadron remains faithful to the Government.

CUT RAILWAY LINE. COPENHAGEN, Nov. 8. Revolutionists have cut the North German railway lines south of Flensburg, in Schleswig-Holstein. This breaks communication from the north with Hamburg.

CUTTING OFF NEWS. LONDON, Nov. 8. Telegraphic communication between German and foreign countries will be cut off, according to a Berlin message. Only government telegrams will be allowed transmission.

THE KAISER MUST ABDICATE. LONDON, Nov. 8. The German majority parties have held a final discussion of the question of Emperor William's abdication, and will without doubt unanimously demand that he abdicate, according to a Berlin despatch to the Copenhagen Politiken, forwarded by the Exchange Telegraph correspondent. The abdication, it is added, will probably occur to-morrow.

SERBIAN TROOPS WELCOMED. LONDON, Nov. 8. Serbian troops have crossed the Danube into Hungary where they have been received with the greatest enthusiasm, says an official statement issued by the Serbian War Office on Thursday.

FRENCH ADVANCE CONTINUES. PARIS, Nov. 8. French troops resumed their advance along the whole front this morning. The War Office to-day reports that French units have reached the railway junction of Liart, about 20 miles north of Rethel. The French early to-day captured Singly, less than eight miles south of Mezieres, and fifteen hundred prisoners and much material were captured yesterday.

DIDN'T GET HIM. COPENHAGEN, Nov. 8. Prince Henry of Prussia, brother of Emperor William, left Kiel on Wednesday in an automobile flying a red flag, the Schleswig Volks Zeitung states. He was pursued by marines who fired a dozen shots at him. Prince Henry arrived at Flensburg in Schleswig. His chauffeur was wounded by the marines who fired on the prince.

WILL ANNOUNCE ARMISTICE. WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 8. The statement was authorized at the White House shortly after ten o'clock this morning that whenever word of

the signing of an armistice in France was received, President Wilson would himself announce it immediately.

CASUALTY (NFD.) LIST. OTTAWA, Nov. 8. The casualty list issued to-day contains the names of J. Perry, H. R. Grace, Nfd., wounded, and C. J. Macpherson, St. John's, Nfd., ill.

REACHED FRENCH LINE. PARIS, Nov. 8. The white flag bearers reached the left wing of General Debeny's army at ten o'clock last night. They arrived at the place indicated by the Allied supreme commander within the French lines about two o'clock this morning and passed the remainder of the night there.

MET FOCH AT NINE. WASHINGTON, Nov. 8. The German armistice delegates entered conference with Marshal Foch at 9 o'clock this morning. French time, the State Department announced officially to-day.

PRINCE MAXIMILIAN RESIGNS. LONDON, Nov. 8. Prince Maximilian of Baden, the Imperial German Chancellor, has resigned, according to a German wireless despatch picked up here to-night. The wireless says that Prince Maximilian tendered his resignation in view of the altered parliamentary situation, but that the acceptance of it is still outstanding.

EMPEROR WILLIAM DECLINES. AMSTERDAM, Nov. 8. Emperor William, of Germany, has declined to accede to the demands that he abdicate, says a German wireless despatch picked up here to-night, to the ultimatum of the Socialists. The Emperor replied through Minister of the Interior, Dr. Ewa, that he refused to abdicate voluntarily, on the ground that he could not at the moment of peace undertake the terrible responsibility of handing Germany over to the Entente and delivering up the country to anarchy.

SHIPPING QUESTION. LONDON, Nov. 8. Sir Laming Worthington Evans, Minister of Blockade, announced to-day that reminders had been sent to the governments of neutral countries that the British government had always declined to recognize any transfers of enemy cargoes made during war and that the neutral governments had been warned that his majesty's government would refuse to recognize either during or after the war any such transfer to neutral flag, or ownership made before the final conclusion of peace, except with special consent. The British government, the minister said, holds that the Allies have a claim against the shipping of the Central Powers in view of their illegal submarine campaign, and they do not intend to allow their claim to be defeated or prejudiced by any such transfer.
